The City Council met Nov. 11th in regular session, Mayor Scott presiding. The roll call showed nine members present.

PETITIONS.

Petition of John Hunter, asking to have Fourth East Street graded as far south as Liberty Park. mittee on streets.

Petition of Theodore J. Barker, relative to the length of time the fence around the Opera House building is to be kept up to the annoyance of the business men west on Second South Street. Committee on streets.

Petition of James Bush, asking that some action be taken in regards to a former petition for injuries to a horse. Committee on claims.

Petition of Margaret B. Harvey to have an electric light placed in Willard Court, between West Tem-ple and First West, on Sixth South Street. Committee on improvements.

Petition of A. Keysor to have his license transferred to Parker and Depue. Committee on liceuse.

Petition of B. G. Fox for injuries sustained by himself and wife on account of his horse stepping in a hole in a culvert at the corner of South Temple and Fifth East Streets. Committee on claims.

Petition of W. S. Martin calling attention to the condition of Fifth South and Fifth West Streets and asking that sald streets be put in a suitable condition for travel. Committee on streets.

Petition of Supervisor Paul for authority to repair the old mill property on First East and North Temple Streets where the city stock

is now stabled. Authorized,
Petition of N. L. Webb to have a
bridge built at the intersection of State Road and Roper Street. Committee on streets.

A. Miner made a verbal petition asking for a rebate of taxes on the property of Thos. Harris, deceased, as the family are lu destitute oir-cumstances. Committee on finance.

Petition of the Salt Lake City Brewery Company asking that the time allowed for their temporary malt building to remain on its present site be extended to eighteen months. Grauted on condition that petitioner furnish bonds that they will remove said building at the expiration of that time.

John W. Snell stated that he had a contract for a water tunnel 500 feet long, 300 feet of which is now completed. As it has been intimated to him that the Council prefers the work done elsewhere, he proposed that the city pay him the 20 per cent retained, and then that he would do the work on a tunnel two miles further up City Creek.

The matter was referred to the

city engineer.
A proposal of W. W. Diel to bore
two wells near Liberty Park was referred to the committee on waterworks.

Petition of Arthur M. Nelson and others, asking for the opening and improving Fourth East Street, between Ninth South and Roper streets, was referred to the committee on streets.

REPORTS.

The City Attorney filed a report regarding the right of the Council to compel the railroad to employ flagmen at street crossings in the city. He introduced an ordinance governing the matter.

The following report of City Recorder Hyams was confirmed:

To the Hon. Mayor and Members of the City Council:

Gentlemen—I beg leave to report that the notice of intention of extend-ing the water mains on the following ange the water mains on the following named streets, to wit: First East and Eighth South streets, Tenth East from the center of Third and Fourth South to Fifth South streets and Sixth East from the center of Third and Fourth South to Fifth South have all been with the street and street published according to law and ordin-

ances in such cases provided. The only objection filed being to the ex-tension of Sixth East Street. The number of square feet represented in the district of the proposed extension is 762,300, the number of feet protesting being 404 079, all of which is respectfully submitted.

PROTEST AGAINST SEWER TAX. The following protest to the con-firmation of the tax for sewers in Dist. No. 2 was submitted:

To the Mayor and Council, of Salt Lake City, Utah: Gentlemen: --We, the undersigned property owners embraced in District

No 2, respectfully call your attention about to levy on blocks No. 67-68-49
-42-41-40-39-and 38, plat "A,"
said assessment being set forth in
printed notice dated Salt Lake City,
October 28th, 1890, and signed Louis
Hyans, Recorder. We desire to Hyams, Recorder. We desire to enter our protest to the amount of taxation, which is at the rate of three cents per square foot. At this rate each hio k will amount to \$13,068.00. this rate This we consider burdensome and oppressive, and particularly so when all of us have paid very heavy taxes quite resently. The tax bears no proportion to the last tax collected sewer purposes heretofore, being several hundred per cent more. It may be argued that the tax was insufficient to complete the sever at that time, but we see no reason why we should be compelled now to why we should be compelled now to pay either a portion of the deficiency or go beyond the extreme limit of taxation. We should not object so much if the burden could be thrown on those benefited before, but even then we doubt if the insufficency of the tax at that time would warrant an the tax at that time would warrant an oppressive and unjust tax at this time. While we desire a sewer, yet if it can only be built at anchan extravagant rate, it is better to do without it than cause a few property holders to be taxed beyond all reason. At this rate to sewer this elly would require several million dollars, and those particular blocks on which this tax sought to be levied are in no worse condition or require sewers any condition or require SAWARE greater than the remaining portions of greater than the remaining portions of the city; neither do we want to be called upon to pay an excessive tax which other property hold-ers in other parts of the city will not be called upon to pay and pay for many years to come, and at which time we trust they will not have such cause of complaint. Many of us have paid taxes which we believe to have paid taxes which we believe to have been burdensome, and could have been lightened by a fair and im-partial system of distribution of values, and now, when we are about to be called upon for another tax, which is beyond all reason and justice. we must enter our earnest protest and appeal to your honorable body for a stay to such an injust and oppressive R. K. Thomas, M. S. Walker,

and a host of others.

The next protest was from J. E. Dooley, and was as follows:
