THAT DOG CASE.

The case of John Hammer against Arthur Watts, suit brought to replevin a fox-terrier dog, came up yesterday afternoon before Judge Albert Howell. Both parties to the action had a number of witnesses to testify to their side of the case.

The committee on waterworks reported progress. They had examined the supply of water from various springs in Provo canyon from which it is proposed to supply the city waterworks system with water. The committee also found a large quantity of water that can be obtained from the various springs which the city has appropriated. The quantity from all sources is about 690 second feet and the cost of piping from the present intake of the water system to Thayers' spring, above them, which is about 600,000 cubic feet per day is estimated.

DEATH OF W. J. BONHAM.

Yesterday at 10 o'clock Walter J. Bonham, a veteran of the war, who waited for 20 years a respected citizen of Provo, passed away, the cause of his death being an affection of the heart.

Mr. Bonham was born in Findlay, O., Sept. 11, 1840. He served in company G, Ninety-ninth Ohio, and took part in the battles of Lookout Mountain and Missionary Ridge, and after the war was engaged in teaching, but at the age of 40 turned to business, first at the academy review in Washington. In 1881 he founded a school, the Logansport, and taught there until 1885, when he moved to Ogden.

PROVO, Oct. 21.—The following business was transacted by the city council last evening.

The police justice reported for September that 23 arrests had been made and \$41 collected in fines.

The committee on streets and alleys recommended that the city be re-paved across the following streets: Academy avenue on First North and Second South, and across Fifth West on Center street. Report adopted.

Ordinances were passed providing for territory lying north of Provo City and west of Provo City being incorporated in the city limits, as petitioned for by the city planning commission.

The recommendation was adopted.

The auditor's report for the quarter ending Sept. 30, accompanied by a communication from the mayor with reference thereto, was submitted and accepted.

An ordinance was introduced, making the license for public alleys \$4 per year, plus 25 cents for each ditch and passed its first reading.

An ordinance was introduced fixing the salaries of the officers and members of the police and fire departments as follows:

Chief of police, \$1,220 per annum.

Captain of police, \$1,080 per annum.

Night jailor, \$60 per annum.

Chief engineer of fire department, \$30 per annum.

Captain of fire department, \$900 per annum.

Electrician, \$600 per annum.

Fireman, each, \$60 per annum.

The ordinance passed its first reading when the council adjourned.
