

HINTS TO AMATEUR GARDENERS.

GERMINATION OF SEEDS.

Darkness, and definite amounts of heat, moisture and oxygen are required to accomplish the germination of seeds. The seeds are stored with enough energy to enable them to develop a certain length of shoot and root so it is not necessary to have the soil in which to sow them rich, provided it is intended to transplant the seedlings. It is important to have good drainage, and at the same time should not dry up too quickly.

The amount of oxygen supplied to seeds regulates itself, if they are planted in soil that will readily admit air. Heat and moisture should be carefully regulated. A mixture containing equal parts of loam, leaf-mold or peat with a good sprinkling of sand will give best results except for seeds of aquatic plants, orchids, etc., which require special and expert treatment.

In preparing soil in which to plant seeds, it should be passed through a coarse screen to remove lumps. If the seeds are to be sown in pots, the latter should be cleaned and a few pieces of broken pots or pebbles placed in the bottom of the pot for drainage. Fill the pots with the soil, raking the surface firm and level. If the seeds are very small, sift fine soil on top and immerse the pots in water, allowing them to soak well before sowing the seed. The latter should be scattered over the surface if they are small, not covered. Place over them a pane of glass.

THE HOME VEGETABLE GARDEN.

In planning the vegetable garden, consider well three things: 1.—Sufficient supply for the family; 2.—a continuous succession of crops; 3.—cheapness of cultivation.

A garden of 100 by 150 feet may be so handled as to supply a family of five or six persons. Half an acre will supply such a family with \$100 worth of vegetables, besides enough for their own use. Perhaps more important than money value, however, is the advantage of having vegetables close at hand so they need not be gathered until shortly before time to use them. This greatly improves their flavor.

The secret of a successful garden is keeping the ground occupied with a crop. As soon as one crop is harvested, start another. Put a quick growing crop in the same bed with one that is slower. The former will be used up by the time the latter is large enough to fill the bed.

The garden should be as near the house as is convenient, and the nearer it is the more care it is likely to receive. As the work in the garden is usually done in spare time, ground having a gentle slope toward the south or southeast is most desirable. It is

An advantage if it is protected on the north either by a hill, a hedge,

fence, a building, or a light board fence to break the wind.

Considerable care should be used in preparing the soil for some crops, and in fertilizing the ground, and these subjects will be gone into more thoroughly in future articles.

VIBURNUMS.

Viburnums are handsome and vigor-

ous shrubs of the eastern cultivation, succeeding best in rather moist situations. There is beauty in their form and flowers, as well as foliage.

Among the best varieties is Appalachian, growing about six feet high, with thin, leathery leaves, flowering in the early part of June. Berries follow the handsome flowers, and the fruit changes from green to rose and finally to bluish black.

English Wayfaring tree or Hobbie Bush, grows to 12 to 15 feet at its best. The flowers are small and white appearing in May and June, in flat clusters at the ends of the branches. The fruit is red changing to black, and

the leaves die off a rich red.

High Bush Cranberry is a handsome shrub 5 to 10 feet high, which in autumn is striking by reason of its clusters of fine red berries and the color of its leaves.

The well known "Snowball" (viburnum opulus aeternum) has rounded masses of white flowers. Japan snowball (viburnum plicatum), is a straight robust flowering shrub of neat and graceful habit with dark green leaves. It bears flower trusses three inches or more across. Viburnum tomentosum or which the Japan snowball is a variety, is a handsome plant with broad fat flower heads, which so cover the

branches as to render it an object of singular beauty.

Arrow-wood is a small growing shrub seldom more than 5 to 10 feet high, with light colored bark and flowers of dark blue, large and showy, followed by purple fruit which hangs long on the plants.

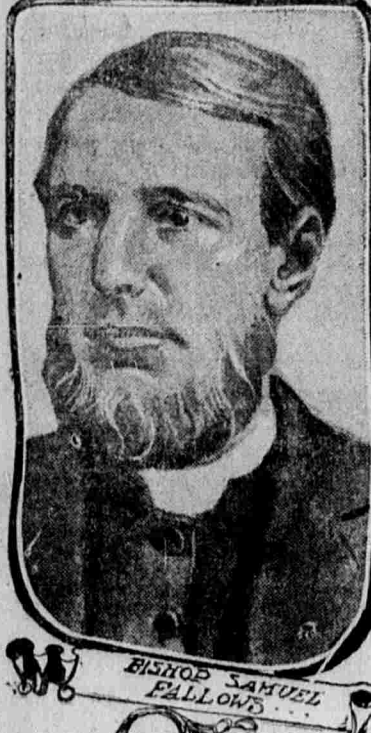
