

EDUCATION VERSUS CRIME.—The truth of the adage, that "education forms the common mind," is aptly illustrated by the criminal statistics of this city for the past year. 55,751 persons were arrested during the year for criminal offences, and of that number 15,297 could neither read nor write, and 564 others could read only. This exhibit shows the close affinity between ignorance and crime. Education is the great safeguard against vice, while ignorance is the hot-house in which crime vegetates, and from whence it goes forth to poison the social atmosphere. The large proportion of youthful criminals is a further evidence upon this point. The number arrested between ten and fifteen years of age was 3,449; between fifteen and twenty, 5,441, and from twenty to twenty-five, 10,787. This shows that more than one-third of the crime committed in the city is perpetrated by persons who have hardly arrived at years of maturity. Many other interesting statistics are exhibited in the criminal report which philanthropists and reformers, as well as the public generally, will do well to ponder. This, it is shown that the proportion of male criminals is about double that of the females—36,273 of the former, and 18,478 of the latter. The aggregate number is made up of nearly all nationalities. The Irish are represented by fifty per cent. of the whole number of criminals; twenty-nine per cent. are Americans, and the remaining twenty-one per cent. are divided among natives of other countries. It is a singular fact, as shown by the statistics, that the proportion of single criminals is much larger than of those who are married. Of the former there were 31,319, and of the latter 23,432. The fact that so large a proportion of all crime committed in the city is of foreign origin, while only twenty-nine per cent. is American, shows better than any other example the influence of education forming the habits of a people. In consequence of the wretched system of many European Governments, the people are almost wholly debarred from the privileges of education; while in this country there is a liberal system of free education, which, though faulty in many respects, exerts an important influence in turning the youthful mind into the channel of rectitude and right. In this is the whole secret of moral reform. Popular instruction, rather than punishment, is the true antidote to crime. [N. Y. Sun.]
