

TOMMY RYAN DEFEATS CARTER.

A Fierce Six-Round Fight He Retains His Title.

THE KNOCKOUT WAS CLEAN

It was the result of superior timing and a bleeding mass of senseless humanity.

Hinsdale, Fort Erie, Ont., Sept. 15.—Tommy Ryan may be the veteran of the middleweights in the prize ring, but he is still far from a back number. Tonight, in the arena at Fort Erie, in a vicious boxing fight, he knocked out "Big" Carter of Brooklyn in the last minute of the sixth round. The knockout was clean and decisive, and came chiefly as the result of superior timing and a bleeding mass of senseless humanity.

Steady and heavy hitting, proud of his endurance, full of energy, confidence and ambition, Carter was no mean opponent. In fact, he hustled Ryan throughout the fight, forcing him to corner to corner with wicked punches which effectively destroyed any effect on Ryan's part to box prettily.

After the fight, Ryan finally went to the game as only a few can. He hung and stabbed Carter until he had him bleeding and bewildered and then reversed and placed right arm jolts on the humbled and husky young fellow, a bleeding mass of senseless humanity, to the floor.

When Carter gamely and tried hard, he suffered about all the visible punishment that was meted during the fight. Such men as McCoy, Jack O'Brien and others looked with amazement on the Kansas City man's work tonight. While the bout was too short to sufficiently test Ryan's endurance, there was nothing very terrifying to his backers in the weariness he displayed at any time. The very nature of the fight put up by Carter prevented him from displaying at his best. His well known footwork, but his side-stepped, lunged and plunged in the beautiful manner of old.

When forced to mix he went at it with a vengeance and with real judgment, and when in the fifth and sixth rounds Carter showed up a bit Ryan jabbed him unmercifully, reduced him to a pliant mass of senseless humanity, the knockout seemed only a question of moments.

When the men weighed in this afternoon Carter stripped at precisely 155, while Ryan made the weight with all his clothes on. Ryan was the favorite at 2 to 1 and 10 to 1.

The men entered the ring at 8:35. The seconds for Carter were Bob Armstrong and Kid McPartland. For Ryan, Harry Peters and Harry of Birmingham. George Siler was introduced as referee.

THE FIGHT BY ROUNDS.

Round 1.—The ring called the men to the center of the ring at 9:37. Carter at once began edging Ryan into the corners. Carter swung left twice and was blocked. Ryan swung right hand in the ear and followed with a wicked left on the neck. Carter did not seem disturbed and tried right for the jaw. Ryan ducked. Carter put heavy right over Ryan's head and Tommy swung both hands to the head. Carter missed two heavy swings and kept boring in. Carter put a heavy right on the body. Round 2.—Carter's opening feinted slightly at the mouth from the effect of Tommy's jab. Carter went in with heavy swings for the head and body and was blocked. Round 3.—Ryan put all his force in a right over the kidneys and then sparred away. Carter chopped Tommy on the ear coming out of a clinch. Carter forced Ryan about the ring, hitting him but not well placed. Ryan was tired, but using a glancing blow from left to the head, nearly sent Carter down. They were mixing very savagely at a time. Ryan was weathering the storm the better of the two and while tired, smiled at his friends and Carter's shoulder in the closing minutes.

Round 4.—Ryan began jabbing and playing for the body. Carter tore in with heavy swings and made Ryan duck. Ryan was blocking. Repeatedly Ryan ducked left. Tommy sent a glancing blow with a left jab and a little later slapped him twice smartly over the eye with a right. Ryan began fighting Carter on the head staggered Tommy. Carter both went at it again fiercely, hitting badly from cuts on the face. Just before the close a left jab stepped Carter for a moment.

Round 5.—Carter went right into his face and although he lunged up about the crumpled a left to the jaw staggered Ryan. He is a cousin of Yousoff, the one time world's champion who was drowned four years ago. Morah was a member of the Sultan's auxiliary guard and won fame by his wonderful strength. After leaving the guard he became a professional wrestler and began traveling. While in Europe he defeated Tom Cannon, and Pilonovsky, the Russian stranger.

After coming to this country he defeated, in catch-as-catch-can, Tom Cannon, and Spokane defeated Victor, a giant almost seven feet tall and weighing 375 pounds. COUNCIL ON SALOON TRAGEDY

Sunday's Lamentable Affair Discussed by City Solons.

IGNORANCE OF THE POLICE

Chief Paul Says They Didn't Know The Place Was Open—Other Business Last Night.

The Oas saloon tragedy of Sunday was discussed by the council last evening and several interesting matters were developed. The most startling discovery was that the police, according to the statement of Chief Paul on the floor of the council, were unaware of the fact that the saloon where the tragedy occurred was open and doing business on Sunday. The other discovery was that the license for the place had expired on Sept. 6, and since that date the saloon has been doing business without a license. The matter was settled by deciding to notify the party who holds the license for the place to appear next Monday night and show cause why the license should not be revoked, or rather to show cause why the council should not refuse to renew the license.

The matter was brought up by Easley after all the other business before the council had been disposed of. He said that on Sunday a tragedy occurred in one of the saloons of this city, which had brought increased the people of the city and he thought the matter should be investigated. He said he would like to hear Chief Paul's explanation of the affair.

The chief, with a look of surprise, arose from his seat and stated that he had issued orders for all saloons to be closed on the Sabbath and he supposed that this saloon was closed. He said the department had no official knowledge that the place was open. In answer to a question from Councilor Cotterrell he stated that the Salt Lake Brewing company held the license for the place.

Dupuy Recorder Simons informed Councilor Hewlett of the license committee that the license for the Oas saloon had expired on Sept. 6 and had not been renewed. This information forth some severe criticisms from President Cotterrell directed to the city treasurer and license collector. He said he thought the council should be instructed to see that the license collector attends to his business.

Hardly had moved that the recorder notify whoever holds the license for the place to appear next Monday night and show cause why the same should not be revoked. The motion was carried.

REFUNDS DAHLSTEDT'S MONEY.

The Dahlstedt license matter was settled for good by the passage of Hewlett's resolution providing that the sum of \$300, paid into the treasury by A. Dahlstedt for a liquor license, be refunded to him.

NO MORE TECHNICALITIES.

As a precaution against the possibility of another such technical point being raised as in the Dahlstedt case, where he paid a quarter's license into the city treasury and obtained a receipt for it and then claimed that he could not be licensed on the strength of that receipt, a resolution, introduced by Hewlett, was passed which provides that the money so paid in shall be held as the property of the applicant and not deposited as part of the funds of the city until the license has been granted by the license committee. The resolution was passed by a vote of 10 to 2.

That the city treasurer be, and he is hereby instructed that any and all amounts of money received by him from any applicant for a license to sell or manufacture intoxicating liquors in Salt Lake City, shall be held by him as the property of the applicant, and not be paid out of the city treasury until the license has been granted by the city council of Salt Lake City, Utah.

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ARTESIAN WATER.

The council decided to authorize the special committee on reservoirs to investigate the feasibility of using the water from the artesian wells in Liberty park in the city's water system. The matter was brought up by Councilman Viegus introducing a resolution providing that \$1,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be appropriated to the use of the special reservoir site committee to investigate the feasibility of securing the water from the artesian wells and report an
