E. wells and report an estimate of the cost to the council as soon as possible. The substitute resolution was passed. NEW FIRE LIMITS. An ordinance was passed slightly changing the fire limits of the city. The changes were made so as to allow th construction of a large frame granary near the corner of Second West and Fifth South streets and were agreed to by Chief Devine of the fire department L. P.C. 53 .602 W. and Building Inspector Ulme On the east side the limit is changed Third East and Fourth South o Third East and Fifth South. On the west side it is changed from ,447 Fifth West and Fourth South to Sec-West and Fifth South streets. M.
