## TABERNACLE CHOIR MAY YET GO TO CHICAGO

Telegram From Windy City Announces Negotiations Are Still Open for Trip.

OGDEN, Nov. 6.—The following telegram was received by Ticket Agent C. A. Henry on Thursday evening, and was signed by a railroad official in Chicago: "Advice Ballantine to disregard the telegram from Manager Rose that the choir cannot come. Negotiations are still open." This indicates that there is yet a possibility of the Ogden choir making the trip to Chicago to sing at the United States Land and Irrigation exposition to be held in the "Windy City" from Nov. 20 to Dec. 4. No definite word has been received from Manager C. J. Rose of the choir, and Prof. Joseph Ballantine states that the organization is keeping up its practices the same as if nothing had happened. The "Irrigation Ode" is well in hand by the singers, and they will be prepared to carry out the original program if called upon to do so. It seems that some misunderstanding has arisen between the railroad people and the managers of the Chicago Tribune and there is now a strong hope that this will be cleared up in time to permit the Ogden people to make satisfactory arrangements for the trip. It is generally conceded that no better advertisement for Ogden and Utah in general could be sent out than this large body of singers, and much disappointment will be caused if the trip is not made.

**TO USE STEAM ON LINCOLN AVE.**  
OGDEN, Nov. 6.—A petition will be presented to the city council Monday night by President Simon Hamberger of the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad, asking permission to use steam engines on Lincoln avenue for a short time, until the new power house now under construction at Lagom is completed. Mr. Hamberger says that his road and depot will materially increase the value of property in that neighborhood but the property owners are very much opposed to his using steam power as they fear that once permitted it will very likely be continued. There seems to be no doubt that the continuous use of steam engines on that avenue would be very detrimental to the health of the people living there.

In one application Mr. Spencer asks for 20 cubic feet per second of the flow of the left hand fork of the South fork of Ogden river.
