PROTESTANTISM AND POPERY.

The Pope is becoming more and more important under the restraints imposed upon him by the Italian Government. A Danish statesman has been elected to the position of plenipotentiary, of which he is the head, and the civil cannot remain together for one of them. There can be no doubt as to which he would like to see restricted, but if the prospect of being so restricted is so doubtful, it is not surprising that his department will be the one that will be most necessary of wanting.

On Thursday last the Roman Catholic Church, as the chief topic of discussion in the Methodist Episcopal annual, Dr. M. T. Myers, who took the initiative, plunged into the subject of the temporal power of the Pope, which, by asserting, there would be an attempt to restrict. Dr. Myers also dealt upon the effects of the Catholic Church as a political power, not only in the United States, but also in other countries, and pointed out the efforts of the Pope to bring about the establishment of a universal political system.

The Rev. Mr. Nicholas took up the part of the subject that related to the Catholic Church as a religious power, but he approached no danger to the Protestant faith on account of its existence. One notable feature of the discourse was the comparatively tolerant spirit which pervaded the speeches. The old antagonism hereafter so bitter among the Protestant clergy toward Roman Catholics seems to be dying out among the sects.
