The appeal of Attorney H. R. Watrous, who was convicted of embezzling \$10 that belonged to Elizabeth Rands, and sentenced by Justice Nelsen to pay a fine of \$20 or go to jail for twenty days, has been dismissed by agreement, and the defendant remanded to the justice with orders to execute the sentence.

The other appeal case of Attorney Watrous has been re-set for April 18th. Watrous was in this case found guilty of embezzling \$24, the property of Miss Mattle Sanders, it was secured on a note she had given him to collect, and it is alleged he appropriated it to his own use. Justice McMaster sen-tenced him to imprisonment for 50 days service to the community at large and

tenced him to imprisonment for 50 days or pay a fine of \$50. W. H. Paimer came up before Jus-tice Nielsen today for his hearing on the charge of having had criminal in-timacy with Miss Elia Alexanderson. Miss Alexanderson was the only wit-ness and at the conclusion of her testi-mony, the defendant was bound over to the district court in \$500 bonds, in de-fault of which he wended his melan-choly way back to the county jail.
