

CLIPPINGS.

The house of Luther Briggs of Davenport, Delaware county, New York, was burned on the 27th of January and five of his children perished in the flames.

—A man went into a store in Hawesville, Ky., on the 7th of Feb'y, with a lighted bomb in a basket of eggs which exploded, blowing the store to pieces and wounding himself and some others mortally and several severely.

—The pretty widow, Madame Bodisco, attended the President's Levee, in her Court dress, valued at fifty thousand dollars.

—The last annual return of the public revenue and expenditure of Great Britain, exhibits the Post Office in a very favorable financial position, the ordinary receipts having been £3,175,560, while the expenditure was £1,894,917; making the balance of receipts over expenditures, including outstanding balances and claims, £1,289,643.

—The number of lunatics in the Eastern States and in California is increasing rapidly. In some of the States, the asylums are filled to their utmost capacity. The sufferers are from all classes and every rank in society, legislators, lawyers, merchants, mechanics, tradesmen and common laborers, with a large percentage of females, are to be found in the lists of those who are thus afflicted.

—The taxable property in Ohio at the assessed value in 1859 amounted to \$900,000,000.

—The winter in Northern California has been severe and thousands of cattle have perished. Feed, it is said, is very scarce, more so than it was ever known at this season of the year.

—Quicksilver has been discovered between the head of Napa Valley and the Geysers, existing in a quartz ledge in a liquid state.

—A resolution has been offered in the Virginia House of Delegates, requiring every one who has emigrated from, or shall emigrate from a non-slaveholding State to Virginia, to take an oath to support her constitution and laws, and defend her soil and institutions against her enemies.

—The daughter of a late distinguished physician of Philadelphia has gone into a convent, taking the veil, and gives to the institution her whole property, amounting to \$60,000.

—A prize of 1,200 francs has been awarded to Prof. Buschmann of Berlin, by the French Academy of Inscriptions, for his recent work on the vestige of the Aztek language in northern Mexico and the northernmost regions of America.

—The Missouri Legislature has refused, by a vote of 82 to 22, to charter the South Western University, at Jefferson city, on the ground that Northern Methodists are Abolitionists.

—The Oregon and Red Star Companies, says the Nevada Journal, the former at Forest City, and the latter at Alleghanytown, met in the center of the ridge between those two places on Thursday, January 19th. There is now a subterranean passage from one town to the other—one mile in length. The distance over the ridge is two miles. By tunnel it is shortened one-half.

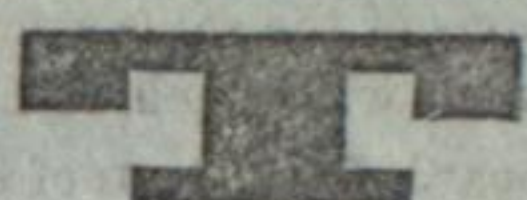
