among the leap years. The year is 360 days, 5 hours and 49 minutes long; eleven minutes are taken every year to make the year 365% days long, and every fourth year we have an extra day. This was Julius Cæsar's ar-rangement. Where do these eleven minutes come from? They come from the future and are paid by omitting leap year every 100 years. But if leap year is omitted regularly every 100th year, in the course of 400 years it is found that the eleven minutes taken from each year will not only have been paid back, but that a whole day will will have been given up. So Pope Gregory XIII., who improved on Cæsar's calendar in 1582, decreed that every centurial year divisible by four shou'd be a leap year after all. So we borrow eleven minutes each year, more than paying our bo rowings back by omitting three leap years in three centurial years, and square matters by having a leap year is the fourth cen-turial year.
