According to the specification, the inventor employs a machine similar to those for making pins or nails; a roll of wire being placed on a reel, the machine nips off a piece of a given length and forces one end of it into the steel Fine soft iron wire drawn to the shape of the body of the type is used for the purpose. After leaving the machine, the types require trimming by hand. When this has been effected, they are placed in metal boxes with the materials used for cementation, and are heated to a proper temperature in a furnace. The inventor says that, with a single machine and steam to the extent of one nominal horse-power, he can produce thirty-five thousand types in twelve hours; and that while the faces are far more perfect and durable, the types themselves are cheaper than those in general u.e.
