LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

The examination of the evidence in the case of the two men who were arrested at the various meetings in the evening.

There was general talk yesterday afternoon that the heat was so great as to be very trying.

THEATRE.—There was, we are sorry to say, not so large an attendance at the Theatre last night, at Mr. Wheatleigh's benefit, but all present, who admired the legitimate drama, and the natural acting, had a "first of its kind," with Mr. Wheatleigh in the title role.

The engagement of Mr. Wheatleigh, financially, has not been so successful as could have been wished, which is to be regretted, for it is seldom that an actor of such sterling merit appears on the Salt Lake stage. Not but what our theatregoers have an opportunity of witnessing the performance of many so-called dramatic "stars," but it is acknowledged that few of them are entitled to be so considered because of their ability as actors of dramatic art. Many of the "stars" of to-day depend for their fame chiefly on personal assurance and two or three ultra-sensational plays, but not so with Mr. Wheatleigh; much of his acting is wonderfully life-like, in fact, much so that the actor is forgotten, so completely is the artist absorbed in the character he is delineating, and this, after all, is the only real test of an actor's claim to greatness in his profession. In this respect, although their pieces are very different, the characters of Mr. Wheatleigh and Mr. Coudock in their respective lines have few, perhaps no, superiors.

We can not but think that if the play of "John Garth" had been produced early in the week, instead of "Arra-na-Pogue," and "Victorian," both excellent pieces, but stage-ridden, and "played out" here, the week's receipts would have been much more satisfactory than they are, both to Mr. W. and the management.

Of the piece presented last night, we cannot afford the space necessary to give a synopsis. Suffice it to say that "John Garth," a rough, gruff, blunt, savagely-outspoken man, but with a heart as tender as a child, and running over with kindness and sympathy, has the misfortune to be maligned and shamefully abused by the only persons of the piece who know him—namely "Gregory Deereham" (Mr. Marden), and "Paula Barrett" (Mrs. Turpe), and to be misunderstood and hated by all others, including even his own daughter, "Minnie Garth" (Miss Adams). The latter class, through the malignant misrepresentations of the former, believe "John" to be a monster of crime and cruelty, and he, conscious of his own integrity, is too proud to give the explanation necessary to clear his character from the foul imputations under which he labors, and it is only after years of waiting and intense suffering that the real worth of the man is discovered.

The support rendered to Mr. Wheatleigh by Messrs. Hardie, Thorne and Marden, and by Miss Adams and Carrie Carter was very good. Of the latter lady's acting, last night, we can scarcely speak in too high terms, and we think of all present, those who admire her most, could not help being surprised at its excellence and finish. We have thought, hitherto, that this lady's specialty was as a subterfuge or low comedienne. After seeing her "Hester Deereham" last night, we are convinced that her range is by no means limited to the above, but that she can do equal justice to a very different class of characters, and we hope to see her have a success.

As a whole, we have seldom seen a better piece than "John Garth," and one better rendered than it was last evening; and if it could be repeated, we think a much larger number would avail themselves of the opportunity of witnessing it.

We have rarely if ever suggested that a complimentary benefit be given to any member of the dramatic profession; but by leaving that to an artist like Mr. Chas. Wheatleigh, it would be creditable to the patrons of the drama in this city, who take the liberty of doing so now, and, in fact, to show their appreciation of his abilities, a number of the leading citizens will at once place the initiative in tendering it, to take place early next week, with a request that "John Garth" be the piece presented on the occasion.

To-night, the last of Mr. Wheatleigh's engagement, the "Lottery of Life" will be presented, in which Mr. W. appears as "Tory, the Swell," supported by Messrs. Graham, Hardie, Thorne, Marden, Harris, Carrie Carter, Miss Adams, Mrs. Bowring, Miss Spencer and others. During the piece Messrs. Hardie and Graham will appear in a grand sparring exhibition as Jim Mac.

The piece and the cast are excellent, and deserve a crowded house.

CALLED.—We had an agreeable call this morning from Mr. Lander Cole, of the Baltimore Evening Journal, who with Mr. and Mrs. David E. Fouts, and party of Baltimoreans, arrived last evening. Let us have, so far as possible, unobstructed, well-kept, and clean streets, and we will have a proportionately larger amount of good feeling and freedom from sickness than now exists.
