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are so immense, and so short a period of time has elapsed since they first began to notice these movements, that they cannot with certainty say whether they are moving in circles or strait lines, it is only by anology that they reason that they are moving round a centre. So little are some of these observers willing to admit, that Prof. Newcomb, simply allows that "as our sun is merely one of the stars, and rather a small one too, it may have a proper motion as well as other stars." The Smithsonian report for 1871, speaking of Herschal, says: The world can afford to wait. Astronomy advances. It may be, in the distant future, that the mysterious centre around which our sun and his worlds revolve, may be detected and afford a solution for other mysteries as well as these. The greatest astronomer is equipped for no more than a Sabbath-day's journey." Another writer remarks, "Madler attempted to show, from an examination of the proper motions of the stars, that the whole stellar universe was revolving around Alcyone, of the Pleides "(or seven stars)" as a centra-a theory; the grandeur of which id to its wide diffusion in popular wr*ing." Mr. Wm. Petrie, of London, writing with regard to this same star says: "Alcyone, a primeval name of the star, means the centre, and has quite recently been discovered to be really the centre round which even our whole solar system, amongst others, revolves."

I was called to this mission Dec. 8, 1878. I have been very busy since that time, acting as head teacher, as lameness, scratches, swinny, sprains, founder, help to President John Spencer, and boss of the work. We have visited all the Lamanites in the valley and most of the white settlers, a good feeling is manifest in and the Lamanites in particular are full of faith and good work, they are as easily controlled as any people I ever lived amongst. We have four of them appointed as teachers, two of them visited the southern district with me, and one of them laboring with M. V. Selman in the northern district, one of them being absent. I must say that taking into consideration that they are without education, they are the most apt teachers of the gospel I ever saw. We have a tithing house erected and nearly completed. President Spencer, M. V. Selman and nine of the Lamanite brethren have been working in the canon getting out timber to build a meeting house and a school house combined.
