WHITE MOUNTTIN MINES BOOMING.

Salt Lake Company Developing a Budding Bonanza West of Goldfield.

ORE ASSAYS 963 OZ. SILVER.

New Mill for White Mountain Mine-Silver Peak Coming to The Front.

President Justice, of the Tonopah-Utah Mining company has just returned from a somewhat extended visit. to the property. The mine is situated in the White mountains, 35 miles west of Goldfield, Nev., and has been under development for the past two years. Speaking of the mine, Mr. Justice said that this summer's campaign had been in a tunnel run to catch the vein which is now in over 300 feet. Considerable work had been done above and ore taken out which gave a return of 963 ounces sliver to the ton. It was to catch this body that the tunnel was driven. The vein was cut just before he left the camp, and he has brought with him a great number of samples which are now being tested. The ore is what is known as fluxing, so much needed to mix with the Tonopah product, and beyond question will run very high in the white metal. The company is composed mostly of Utah people, who have the utmost confidence in the prop-Creole erty, and they will keep the develop-ment up during the winter, believing that by spring they will have a heavy producer. Referring to other properties in the district, Mr. Justice said that the White mountain mine, about two miles from the Tonopah-Utah, was in an ad-Galena vanced state of development.
