The collection of taxes in Weber county this year has been unusually good. Last year was considered a good year for collections by County Treas-urer A. D. Chambers, but this year has been much better than last. During the past week the taxes have been coming n with a rush and Treasurer Chambers and his deputies have been very busy. Up to last night for the past five days over \$75,000 has been collected in and up until last night the treasurer has up until last night the treasurer has taken in \$300,433 of this year's taxes. Yesterday Treasurer Chambers paid out of the taxes collected so far to the state \$30,000; to Ogden City, \$15,-000; to Ogden City schools \$10,000 and as soon as County Superintendent of Schools Wilson submits his apportion-Schools Wilson submits his apportion-ment of school funds for the various districts, \$11,000 will be distributed for that purpose. The treasurer has also during this month called for \$13,-000 of outstanding warrants and will issue another call the first part of next week for \$21,000 more of outstanding warrants.
