Weekly Crop Bulletin and Weather Report.

United States department of agriculture, Idaho section, elimate and erop service, weather bureau, Weekly crop bulletin for week ending Monday, May 1904

Boise, Ida., May 3 .- During the week the temperature averaged somewhat below normal over most of the state, and on several mornings light frosts were of general occurrence, though the temperature did not fall sufficiently low to cause serious injury to vegetation; there was rather more than the usual amount of cloudiness, and numerous amount of cloudiness, and numerous light showers of rain occurred, in some localities accompanied by hall or wet snow, but the average precipitation was considerably less than normal. There was a considerable amount of wind, in some localities causing such rapid evaporation that irrigation was resorted

CROPS.

Fruit-In southwestern valleys, early fruits are heavily set, while later varie-ties are full of bloom; in other sections of the state early fruits are blooming well. So far the crop is prac-

tically undnjured by frost. Grain-Most of the spring grain has been sown in southwestern districts; m other portions of the state seeding has progressed rapidly; early sown grain is coming up well; fall sown grain is mak-ing satisfactory growth; some corn has been planted.

has been planted. Grass-Hay crops have made excel-lent growth and promise abundant yields; much new land has been seeded to timothy and clover, and in some sections extensive preparations are beigg made for seeding to alfalfa. Range

grass continues to thrive. Vegetables-Making of gardens and planting of potatoes is being extended to more elevated sections; garden vege-tables and early potatees have grown well; planting of sugar beet seed is progressing rapidly; the acreage plant-ed to this crop in gastern and northern counties will greatly exceed that of the season of 1903.
