Important Article to all American Newspapers is "Special to The Tribune."

EVEN STEALS HOLY WRIT STORY

Were Large Numbers of Them in Sunday Issue-Sabbath Day Did Not Reduce Cribbing Propensity.

The Salt Lake Tribune, the champion of all newspaper faking plants, had numberless stories in its Sunday issue that were clipped bodily from the big papers of the country, dated according to desire, and then labelled "Special to the Tribune." These "specials" covered every kind of a freak subject that a great news disseminating agency like the Associated Press refused to handle. But they appear to whet the Tribune appetite until its cry is, "More, More!" There were so many of these that the "specials" were dropped from some of them. So flagrant has the deception come to be that several of the Tribune staff shake their heads in shame and disapproval of the methods. To them it is most humiliating to steal the product of other men's brains and money and mark them "special," but unfortunate. ly they have not got control of the policy of what was once a real newspaper, The fact that it was Sunday made no difference and the further fact that the stolen matter related to the Bible, was just as ineffectual. On Saturday evening the various Salt Lake newspapers received the following article from the Church News Association of New York, "free to all newspapers." The Tribune's "fake" editor seized upon it with avidity, and presto! change! it was a "special to the Tribune" yesterday morning.
