

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**ARRIVAL OF PRESIDENT YOUNG AT ST. GEORGE.**—By Deseret Telegraph Line we learn that President Young and company arrived at St. George at two o'clock this afternoon. A detachment of cavalry under Col. Pearce, met them one mile out. On the outskirts, were drawn up to receive them, Major Platt's battalion of infantry, at the head of which, was stationed the Martial Band; next reaching towards the city, were the Saint George Sunday School children, amounting to three hundred, with appropriate banners, conducted by their teachers.

On the arrival of President Young's carriage at the head of Major Platt's lines the "Stars and Stripes" were displayed from the liberty pole on the Public Square, and from a pole on President Snow's mansion, followed by a salute from Captain Milner's artillery, stationed on Mt. Hope, and cheering by the bands. The company then proceeded through an open line of Infantry and Sunday school children, the whole procession moving with music from the band to the residence of President Snow, on the balcony of which the St. George brass band, led by Captain Earle, discoursed sweet music, while mutual greetings were extended to the guests and invitations to share hospitality were extended to all. The procession was then dismissed. The semi-conference of the southern mission will meet to-morrow at 10 a.m. in the basement of the new Tabernacle, which has been fitted up for meetings.

**THE PRESIDENT'S PARTY.**—President Young and party reached Washington at nine this morning. They held meeting in that settlement and at two o'clock started for St. George, which place they expected to reach shortly after three.

**CALLED.**—We had a visit this morning from J. F. Hatch, Esq., of Chicago, who represents the firms of Phillip Wadsworth & Co., wholesale clothing; Bowen, Whitman & Winslow, wholesale dry goods dealers, and Kent, Welch & Co., hat and cap manufacturers, all first class, reliable houses who have done a very satisfactory business with the merchants of this city, Ogden and the north. We understand Mr. Hatch will remain "in the mountains" for several months, for the purpose of forwarding the interests of the firms he represents.

**IDAHO.**—The Boise Democrat says: "We learn from our farmers that the grasshoppers are showing themselves in alarming numbers. Fears are entertained that they will damage the crops as much as they did last year. We hope however that they will soon begin to travel and will let the crops alone." Bands of Chinamen, who had finished their work on the great highway were pushing into that Territory. The editor of the same paper speaking of one of these bands says: "They said they were from the Railroad, and that 'heepo Melican man, heepe Chinaman' were coming to Idaho. We expect to see droves of men soon who have been discharged by the railroad companies. Let them come, all can find employment in Idaho."

**MAY DAY.**—To-morrow is May day. No doubt many of our young folks, tempted by the loveliness of the weather, will spend a day up in the canyons or down by the river. Others attracted by the announcement of Arrah-na-Pogue will crowd the doors of the Theatre long before the hour they should open, and afterwards fill the house with their merriment as the hours pass. We wish them all happiness, wherever they go, or in whatever way they seek to express their joy at the return of spring.

**EUROPEAN MISSION.**—We glean the following items from the Millennium Star: On the 21st of March a Conference was held at the Assembly Rooms, Nottingham, at which President Carrington and some fifteen elders from Utah were present. Elder L. W. Shurtliffe, the President of the Nottingham Conference, reported in a prosperous condition, numbering 324 members. Elder J. S. Richards, E. L. Butterfield, J. M. Ferrin, W. H. Homer, R. W. Egan, J. Sharp, and President Carrington addressed the meetings.

From the Scandinavian mission Elder J. N. Smith writes "that they are baptizing slowly but steadily, and that not a great many will be able to emigrate this season without assistance."

Elder M. Holling, writing from Holland, states "that baptisms and the faith and good works of the Saints are increasing in his field, and he is rejoicing in the blessings attending his labor."

From Zurich, Elder Heber Young writes that in the Swiss and German mission "their numbers continue to increase, and the older members are awakening to greater diligence." President K. G. Maeser, himself and the rest of the Elders were well.

A new edition of the hymn book, will shortly be issued at Liverpool; it will have no alterations from the last edition.

**THIRTEENTH WARD FEMALE RELIEF SOCIETY.**—A meeting of this Society was held yesterday in the Assembly Rooms, at which were present, President George A. Smith, Elder Joseph F. Smith, Bishops E. Hunter and E. D. Woolley, with other Elders and a goodly number of ladies. After the usual opening services the Secretary, Mrs. George Goddard, read the report of the doings of the Society since its organization. It was organized April 18th, 1883, with Mrs. Rachel Grant, Presidentess, Mrs. Anna Godbe and Margaret Mitchell, Counselors, Mrs. A. G. Goddard, Secretary and Mrs. A. M. Musser, Treasurer. The total receipts in contributions, from May 14th 1888 to March 1889 amounted to \$671.05; the total amount disbursed \$331.42. The Society has made much clothing for the needy and held their regular meetings for work and instruction during the year.

After the reading of the report President G. A. Smith, Bishop E. D. Woolley and Elder Jos. F. Smith addressed the assembly, giving much timely advice and wise counsel, seasoned with words of encouragement to the Society; after which Sister Bathsheba Smith was appointed first counselor to the Presidentess, vice Sister Godbe, resigned. Sister Grant closed the proceedings by making several explanatory remarks on the course she and the ladies of the Society had pursued, and thanked the speakers for their encouraging counsel.
