

"many of the prominent citizens of Ogden," but it did not name one of them, save Mr. Breeden, whose presence it inadvertently accounted for by the explanation that he was the chairman of the Weber County "Liberal" committee.

After comparing all the reports of the affair one is forced to the conclusion that the Salt Lake contingent which went down to aid in the applause, had not only the auditorium but the platform also largely to themselves and came home entirely undone through having to work the enthusiasm and the oratory virtually unassisted. The event has left Judge Baskin with a disposition to wipe the dust of Ogden from his feet forever. It was only this morning that we learned the precise cause of the latter's depressed spirits. During Mr. Baskin's speech, we are told a lot of the spectators hissed him roundly. Mr. Baskin was so deeply impressed with his own remarks that he took the hisses for cheers, whereupon, as if in utter despair of silencing him, many of them rose in a body and left the hall.

It is reported of Mr. C. C. Goodwin that he promised the once "Liberal" voters if they would "come back" and resurrect the old *Tribune* standard, he would visit them again some time. Whereat they say the Flambeau club and Salt Lake contingent shouted wildly while the balance of the audience sighed. As to why they sighed authorities differ. It has been suspected for a long time that Mr. Goodwin's genius was not appreciated in Ogden. This might explain not only the sigh but a great many other phenomena in Ogden politics for which the *Tribune* seems unable to account.

Upon the whole the *Tribune* convention was evidently a sad disappointment to the faction and at the same time the very best of evidence to the friends of progress that Ogden is all right.

### THE "LIBERAL" CONVENTION.

Tuesday, July 14, the "Liberal" convention for Salt Lake county, for the purpose of nominating officers and members of the Legislature to be voted for at the ensuing election, and the transaction of other business, took place in the large room underneath the store of the Salt Lake Hardware company, in the Central Block, West Second South street. It had been originally intended to hold the meeting in the Federal court-room, but a session of the Third District court necessitated a change in the arrangement. There was a very large attendance of "Liberals" in response to the call, among those present being many of the "shining lights" of the party resident in the city and neighborhood. Against the platform was placed a silken banner bearing the inscription, "American rule, 1890, on to Liberal Victory."

Delegates to the number named were present from the various precincts as under:

The convention was called to order by Mr. J. M. Ricketts; and the secretary (Mr. M. K. Parsons) having read the call, Colonel Page was elected temporary chairman. He was received with much applause and briefly thanked the meeting for the compliment paid him.

Mr. M. K. Parsons was unanimously chosen temporary secretary.

Col. Sells then moved that a committee of one from each precinct in the city be appointed as the committee on credentials. This was seconded and carried, the following gentlemen being nominated and elected unanimously:

Some conversation then ensued as to the adjournment at this stage, some gentlemen suggesting that a recess be taken until two o'clock, while others suggested three, and others four. Ultimately it was resolved to adjourn until the last named hour, and the company then dispersed.
