MISSOURI.

An attempt at lynching.
 ST. LOUIS, 28.—The Atlantic and Pacific Railroad is completed to Neosho, the extreme southwestern part of the State, three hundred miles from St. Louis.

There is great excitement at Potosi over the arrest of the murderers of the Layne family in that vicinity. The murder was particularly atrocious, and when the perpetrators were caught and confined in jail at Potosi, a mob gathered with the determination of lynching them. The Sheriff summoned an armed posse, who were attacked and fired on by the mob, and finally returned the fire killing one of the rioters.

ILLINOIS.

President's Message.
 CHICAGO, 27.—The Times' Washington special says the President, in his forthcoming message, announces that he still maintains the same position on the Cuba question; also that the only grave differences existing with foreign nations are with England, on the fishery question and the Alabama claims matter.

WASHINGTON.

Sentenced.
 WASHINGTON, 28.—An important item of Southern news, which seems to have been for a time suppressed, reached here this morning, to the effect that E. M. Yerger, who murdered Col. Crane, in Jackson, Miss., more than a year ago, and whose trial and escape caused so much excitement throughout the whole South, has on a second trial been convicted and sentenced to imprisonment for life, it is stated by a jury composed of negroes.

When the Senate meets the new senator from Minnesota, in place of Senator Norton, deceased, will present his credentials. This, with the two senators from Georgia, Farrow and Whiteley, whose credentials were presented, but who were not sworn in last session, will make a full Senate for the first time since 1861.

Senator Drake has not yet been appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Claims, although he is still here and is understood to be urging the President to fulfill his promise made last Summer.

NEW YORK.

Conference of the great powers—Secret Treaty—Naval and military preparations in England.
 NEW YORK, 27.—The Tribune's St. Petersburg special telegraphs on Sunday afternoon that he has good authority for stating a conference of the powers is to be held.

The Tribune's Berlin correspondent, on authority, asserts that at the breaking out of the present war, Prussia agreed, in return for Russia's neutrality to the latter's claim for the abrogation of the Paris treaty, and Russia undertook to prevent Austria from interfering in the war with France.
 The Herald's special, Versailles, 27.—Forti say, Vauvers and Montreux opened a heavy fire last night. A sortie is expected.

FOREIGN NEWS.

FRANCE.

Defeat confirmed—Repulsed—A battle—Russia placable.

TOURS, 27.—The report of the repulse of the Prussians at Neuville is confirmed. A powerful movement of the French army from La Maas has caused the Prussians, who were moving from Alencon to it back.

DIJON, SUNDAY, 27.—The Garibaldians marching last night from Poesque vigorously attacked the outposts of the Prussian rifles. Aid coming to the latter, the Garibaldians were repulsed with great disorder, abandoning their arms; and Werden to-day overtook the rear guard near Poesque by taking a circuit around Poesque. The French loss is 350 killed and wounded. The Prussians lost fifteen. It is said Menotti Garibaldi commanded 2,000 men.

The southern forces around Paris maintained a lively fire throughout Saturday night.
 In reconnoitering near Orleans on the 10th, the Prussian corps encountered the 20th French corps and drove

it from its position at Ladon, Mezières, with serious loss.

On Saturday several French companies attacked the Prussian lines. The companies were repulsed with a loss of forty. A French general was captured. The German loss was trifling.

TOURS, 28.—There was a battle all day on Sunday, between Villiers and Saleux, near Amiens. The French maintained their positions up to half-past four, when Villiers was abandoned before the superior forces and the artillery of the Prussians. The French were beaten at Bover, but at Dury they maintained their positions. Three thousand Germans were engaged.

VERSAILLES, 27.—A settlement of the Eastern question may be hoped for on the basis of a conference and the withdrawal of the Russian note. After Constantinople and St. Petersburg were rejected as the seat of conference, London was agreed upon. Russia is entirely placable.

ITALY.

FLORENCE, 27.—The Italian note, dispatched to St. Petersburg, remonstrates against the renunciation of the Paris treaty.

PRUSSIA.

BERLIN, 27.—The main body of the Loire army is ascertained to occupy an entrenched position between Arthenay and Orleans.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Bismarck refuses to interfere—Italy protests—The French claim a victory.

LONDON, 28.—Odo Russell dined yesterday with King William, and was well received. An interview with Bismarck followed. The latter said, while adhering to a conference and having no concert with Russia, he was surprised at the action of Gortschakoff. He declines, however to interfere.

An Italian protest has gone to St. Petersburg.

Figaro implores the government to conclude peace, the defense of Paris being impossible.

The Times hopes the answer to Russia, which goes to-day, will be firm but conciliatory.

The Tours journals speak of the extraordinary activity at the war department.

The French claim a victory at Moreuil yesterday. The battle lasted till darkness interfered. The German army was beaten and driven to the entrenchment before Amiens. The French army of the north was greater in numbers and better armed. The losses are obscurely given in thousands. The Prussian hussars rode down and out to pieces a regiment of Marine infantry. The German loss is severe.
