Tomato Jelly. Peel one quart of ripe tomatoes and shimmer, gently to a soft pulp, strain this pulp through a cheeseeloth bag and sea-son to taste with sait and pepper; to each pint of the strained tomato julce ad hal, i cupful of granulated sugar, and a triblespoonful of constarch dis-solved it half a cupful of cold water; place all of the ingredients in an agate saucepan over the fire and cook for one minute, stirring all the time: remove from the fire and pour into a mold which has been wet with cold water; when firm cut into fancy shapes and serve with cold meats or hot bolled or roast meats. Macaroni and Tomato.

Macaroni and Tomato. Place in a deep kettle filled with boiling water to which one teaspoonful of salt has been added, half a package of maca-roni, allow it to boil for 25 minutes or un-til it is perfectly done, drain in a colan-der and place on a hot dish and place where it will keep warm. Prepare the following sauce: Place in a saucepan one quart of fresh or canned tomato, half bay leaf, half an onion, chopped fine, and sea-son with salt and pepper to taste; a tea-spoonful of parsley chopped fine and a plece of builter the size of an egg, sim-mer all slowly for half an hour, strain and pour over the macaroni which has been sprinkled with grated cheese. Servo very hat. The sauce can be prepared while the macaroni is cooking. Tomato Hash.

Tomato Hash.

Butter a deep baking dish and place in it a layer of peeled and sliced tomatoes over which place a layer of cold sliced chicken, or cold lamb or mutton, then a few drops of ohion juice has been sprin-kled; season with pepper and sait, fill the dish in this manner and pour over the top one egg well beaten, to which add half a cup of milk. Bake a delicate brown. brown.

Frozen Tomato Salad.

Cream of Tomato Soup, Place one quart of pealed and sliced tomatoes in a soup-kettle with one quart of cold water, and let them heat grad-ually; when hot add another quart of cold water, and when this boils add half a cupful of rice which has been thorough-ly washed and picked over, a saltspoonful of pepper, and two teaspoonfuls of salt, and continue the boiling until the rice is tender but not broken; then stir in a thickening made of two tablespoonful of spoonful of flour add a saltspoonful of soda, and a pint of milk, or sufficient to make the soup the thickness of cream; allow all to boil for a few minutes to cook the flour. Serve at once. Frozen Tomato Saind. Select six rips, solid tomatoes, peel and chop line, season with a teaspoonful of salt, a saltspoonful of pepper and one teaspoonful lemon juice Place in an ice cream freezer and freeze solid, then mold into shape, which can be done by dipping out with the ordinary ice cream pyramid scoop, place on lettuce leaves and serve with a spoonful of yellow mayonnaise dressing on top of each cone.
