From the New York Tribune .-Mr. Saville, the late chief clerk of the Treasury department, did not have a too modest appreciation of In settling his accounts in the treasury it was found that he charged a handsome sum for his work and a liberal allowance for expences. His salary per quarter of three months was \$1,000. In addition he received per day, for expenses, the sum of \$25 and for the same time his mileage was not far from \$1,000 a month, or more than any civil officer receives under the government excepting the President and a few foreign ministers.

Vermont seems to be in a very liness and reliability in all its operations bad way as regards its schools. Over 700 of its school-houses, or one third of the whole, are reported as unfit for use, while cheap teachers are everywhere sought for, the ordinary wages being \$1.50 to \$1 a week for women-who constitute a majority of the teachersand \$4 and upward for men. There is no high school system, and it is optional with towns whether to maintain a graded school or not. In the rural districts the number of school children is decreasing every from its old localities.

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
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
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
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
