Whea we see mothers leaving their children day after day to hired nurses, and leaving them evening after evening to find their own way of passing time, and knowing the temptations ever offered children, we wonder so many select the halfway compromise between good and evil.

How does any one accept parentage without its attendant responsibilities? Is a pure life of 30 little consequence? We hear parents say, "I cannot manage my boy." We always want to reply, "It is your own fault." We have known people who acted as though the life of their children for good or evil was not worth a few years of self-denial! It should not be self-denial, either, but pleasure, for the parent to guide the child.

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
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
