But all of the leading local Democrats do not even favor that proposition without first knowing just exactly where Admiral Dewey stands on the great questions of imperialism and bimetallism. Chairman James H. Moyle of the Democratic State committee in discussing the matter today said: "I think Bryan and Dewey would make a Presiiental team that could absolutely not be beaten, provided that Dewey sound on the great questions that di-vide the two parties. Of course it must be known just where he stands on each. Unless his feet are firmly planted on the planks of our platform, he could not hope to receive the nomination. Democrats are glad to know that the admiral is a Democrat, but they must know more; they must know that he endorses all of the party's principles, for in the next campaign principle will

count for more than glory."
