# MEN WANTED IN MILLAND COUNTY

Bobbie Burns Memory Honored Country Can Support Twenty Thousand More Families On Farms.

PLENTY OF WATER AND LAND.

Two Big Irrigation Projects Are Bringing Twenty-four Thousand Acres Under Cultivation.

Wanted, 20,000 progressive young married men to settle in Millard county. For full particulars apply to State Senator Callister.

Senator Callister expresses his request as the big thing about his countythe pressing problem before its people. Two big irrigation schemes approaching completion, make this request necessary. The water is there, the canals soon will be, and the people, 20,000 of them, are wanted to settle in the new town of Abraham, and along thecanals of the Melville Irrigation company. If perchance any one prefers dry farming, there is a great area to the southeast, that Senator Callister declares is the most fertile of any arid land in the

The Abraham Canal company, he says, has taken its water out through the Copper Cut reservoir. Their site was once occupied by a former company which failed. The failure came, however, because the company allowed itself to become tangled up in a bond issue rather than because there was

itself to become tangled up in a bond issue rather than because there was any failure of water or fertile land.

"Utah people were too slow," said Callister, "to take advantage of this chance. It is Colorado people who are developing the proposition, and settlers are now coming in from the east to take the land along the canal.

"There is one proposition, however, our young Utah lads can take advantage of, and it is with the other irrigation canal. The Melville company has bought a controlling interest in the Sevier river bridge, and it will soon bring 12,000 acres under cultivation. The original settlers down that way came from Davis, Weber, Utah and Salt Lake counties, mostly, but somehow the youngsters don't take to farming, and prefer a starched collar at \$10 a week in the city, to independence after a few years' work on the big farm projects of the south.

"What we want is 20,000 people to till

"What we want is 20,000 people to till the land. If they don't come from Utah, they will come from the east, for the opportunities are too good to be passed up much longer.

Senator Callister hopes to have a measure passed through the legislature providing an experiment farm for the arid region in the southeastern part of the county.
