DR. TALMAGE'S REMARKS.

The Assembly Hall last evening was well filled with an audience that gathered to hear Miss Florence Murcutt and Dr. Alice Seabrook, whose remarks on temperance were very interesting, and no doubt conductive to some serious thoughts on the part of those who inaulge too freely in the flowing bowl pr. Talmage and B. F. Grant were called up to speak, and they respended in a very happy manner. The meeting was held under the auspices of the M. I. A. and was presided over by Richard R. Lyman, Stake president of the associations.

Her remarks tendered to show up the dire evil that results from drink. She was giad that hey were total abstainers; giad that temperance was a part of their religion, and expressed the hope that they would be the means of bringing many other

The address of Dr. Alice Seabrook was also interesting and instructive. She began by giving the history of the T. U., telling when and under what conditions it was organized. She spoke of the work that is now doing "for God, and home, and every land." Dr. Seabook spoke of the Sunshine society and of the good that every in-dividual could do by helping and sym-pathizing with others. She pointed pathizing with others. She pointed out the necessity of clean living and faithfulness to pledges and principles. People should be temperate not only

in drink, but in all things.

The chairman then called on Dr. Talmage, who responded in his well known elicitous style. He subscribed heartily to all that the ladies had said and expressed satisfaction at the temperance of the Mormon people He said that this community was as free from vice and intemperance as any he had vice and intemperance as any ne has found in all his travels, and for that reason he was proud of his people. Life was no trifle with them, and although they were a most happy people they were also a serious people. He id that he expected to see grow in the shadow of these mountains a race of strong men, the most virtuous, temperate and upright people on the face of the earth. The speaker then face of the earth. pointed out the injurious effects of stimulants, especially on children. There should be no stimulants in food. drink or literature.

B. F. Grant was called up out of the audience to make a few remarks. He stated that there were seventy-nine sa-loons in Salt Lake and only thirtyfive churches, and of the thirty-five churches, twenty-four belonged to the Latter-day Saints. The revenue to the city accruing from the saloons amounted to \$100,0000 a year, and the brewerles paid Uncle Sam \$85,000. This veyer, did not compensate for the that these institutions accomplish. He had a plan that would close every saloon in the country. The plan was: "You stay away and I'll stay away, and the saloons will close. That is the only way under God's heavens to close

The speaker told some of his experiences in the saloon business in southern Utah, and spoke of the suf-fering among the miners and their families entailed by drink.
