Republican Convention News Excluded.

NEW YORK, N. Y. — The scene at the

convention to order was unprecedented in the

history of the party. The delegates

in the State, indeed it might be said in the

United States. The Academy was filled from

auditorium to gallery. Several hundred ladies

thousand people were within the building.
