From the Lutheran Almanac for 1869,

logical seminaries, 17 colleges, 8 schools
for females, 12 academies, 12 orphan
houses, besides other eleemosynary and
benevolent institutions. In the Lutheran
Church the Gospel is preached in
English, German, Swedish, Norwegian,
Bohemian, and in several Scandi-
navian dialects.

For many years a body of believers,
known as the Reformed Church of
Spain, and now numbering 8,000, have
been worshipping by small companies,
and in secret places. About twelve
churches have been wholly or partially
organized, the one at Malaga contain-
ing 200 members. In a dark cellar they
have printed a few copies of the Testa-
ment and a family catechism. Schools,
established at Bayonne, and Pau in
France, and Lausanne, Switzerland,
are preparing their young men for Bible
readers. These facts, through the re-
cent upheavings in Spain, have come to
the light.

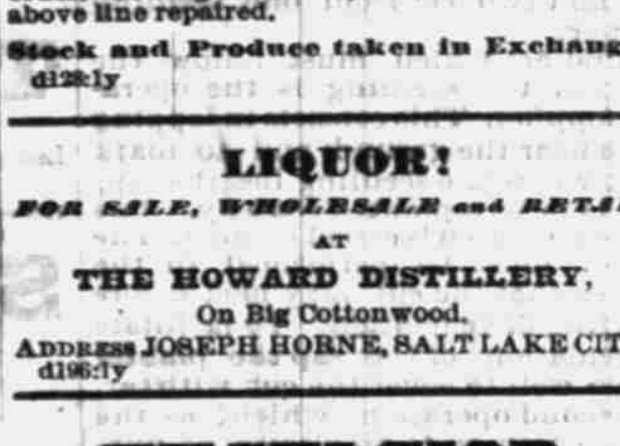
