AMERICAN.

WASHINGTON, 26.—It is stated that Bartlett, attorney of the Pacific Mail Co., left this morning for Minnesota, to attach the property of Wm. S. King, with a view to recover the amount received by him in connection with the subsidy.

On the arrival of the train from Richmond at Alexandria, this morning, it was discovered that ex-Senator James W. Nye, who, when last seen, occupied a section of the sleeping car, was missing; his boots were still in his berth. He was on the way north from Jacksonville, Fla., with his daughter, Mrs. Vyse, and his servant. He retired the previous evening in his usual health, and it is supposed that he got up in the night in a dazed condition, and walked off or fell off the cars while in motion, as he had not been heard from at any station when the train stopped. Some fears have lately been felt by his friends that his mental faculties were waning, and on this account he was induced to join his daughter in Florida, whither she had gone for the benefit of her health.

Several friends of Senator Nye at the capital say there must be a mistake in the report of his death, and that the person to whom the accident occurred is another person of the same name, because his daughter's name is not Vyse, but Walter, and that when these friends last heard from him he was in New York and not able to travel; moreover they have no information of his having passed through Washington on the way south.

The President has nominated James M. Tyner (Ind.), Second Assistant Postmaster General.

A dispatch from Richmond says that ex-Senator Nye has been found there all safe, but nearly nude; it seems that he slipped out of the car just as the train started, and concealed himself in the depot.

BALTIMORE, 26.—An Annapolis letter says that Gordon Claude, a naval cadet, was expelled from the Academy on Wednesday last, for refusing to fence with a colored cadet.

PHILADELPHIA, 26.—The ice on the Schuylkill, at Manyunk, broke up yesterday afternoon, and during the night the river rose rapidly twenty feet above the usual height, and only four feet below the highest point ever reached, submerging all the houses in the lower part of the town, forcing the occupants to abandon them and their contents; the gas works are overflowed, the streets in darkness and all the mills except one have suspended, throwing at least 2,000 persons out of employment.

Woolston's cotton mill was burned last night.

The water at Mayjunk is subsiding.

WASHINGTON, 26.—The Senate, to-day, confirmed O. N. Denny, collector of Internal Revenue; John J. Critchlow, J. Michley, John Smith, B. M. Thomas, P. Glenn and J. L. Bradshaw, Indian agents at the Uintah Valley, Utah; Camp Apache, Arizona; Warm Spring, Oregon; Southern Apaches, New Mexico; the Puebla agency, New Mexico; San Carlos, Arizona, and Hooper Valley, Cal., respectively. Harvey Jewell, Judge of the Court of Commissioners on the Alabama claims, and Jos. N. Tyner, second assistant P. M. General.

MILWAUKEE, 26.—Angus Cameron, senator elect, left to-day for Washington. He denies the report published, that he will unite with the independents in the Senate, and says he will act with the republicans.

NEW YORK, 26.—The steamship Vicksburg, from Port Royal, S. C., came ashore last night near Fear Island, and is a total loss; the crew escaped, and saved the cargo, which consisted of cotton and fruit.

Jos. M. Shaw, owner of the burned building on Duane St., one of the walls of which fell upon St. Andrew's church last evening, and killed and wounded a number of people, has been arrested and held to bail by the coroner. The condition of the walls had given Father Curran, pastor of St. Andrew's, some anxiety, but he was assured, the sexton says, that the architect had complied with the law before attempting to rebuild them; on the other hand it is asserted that one of the engineers of the fire depart-

ment warned the pastor that the walls were unsafe, and that no one should be permitted in the gallery, which would be endangered by their fall. Of the wounded persons only one is considered in a dangerous condition.
