TO INCREASE WATER SUPPLY

Discuss Strawberry Creek Proposition.

Special Correspondence. Payson, Utah Co., June 8.-State Engi-neer Doremus and Atty, F. S. Richards were here tonight and held an enthusi-astic meeting of the farmers and business men of Payson and surrounding towns, in the interest of the Strawberry creek proposition, which concerns the south end of Utah county. Mr. Doremus spoke interestingly of the various propositions to increase the wa-ter supply of the valleys of Utah, Sait Lake and Cache. The diversion of the Strawberry and Bear rivers for use in Utah and Cache valleys would be of double use as it would percolate the soit increase the supply of water coming from those sources. It was Mr. Doremis' be-lief that these valleys could be made to support one person to each acre of land. If was demonstrated that it would be much better for the government to prose-cute this work than private corpora-tions. It is necessary for the communities benefited to express their deafre and en-curage the government to prosecute the work. Atty. Richards spoke interestingly in

U. S. department of agriculture. Ida-bo section. Climate and crop service, weather bureau, Weekly crop bulle-tin, for week ending Monday, June 6. Beginning on the night of May 31, and continuing through June 2, a show -ery period occurred, during which near-ity every section of the state was visited every section of the state was visited by rain sufficiently heavy to be of ma-orial benefit to vegetation, though in tome instances high winds which followed the showers caused very rapid evaporation. Reports as to tempera-ture are somewhat conflicting, but in general indicate an average slightly be-low the normal for the week; on several lights the temperature was sufficiently ow in some sections to retard the growth of vegetation, but no damaging frosts occurred. Water, in streams continues high, in some instances ex-ceeding the record for several years past, but no serious damage is reported.

CROPS,

Fruit—The damage done by the trosts of May 25 and 26 seems to have been over estimated at the time: during the week fruit crops made rapid advance; in southwest valleys the markets are well supplied with strawherries, and some native cherries have been offered; in northern courties there is promise

in northern counties there is promise of a good crop of wild berries. Grain-Grain has made satisfactory progress in most sections; fields which were suffering from drouth a week ago are now in thriving condition as a result of timely rains; burley is heading and some early sown spring wheat is in the boot; there is still some corn to be planted in northern counties. Grass-Conditions have been favor-

Grass-Conditions have been favor-able for the rapid growth of all grasses, hay crops on unirrigated lands have been greatly benefitted by recent rains, and promise good yields; harvest of first crop alfalfa is advancing in a few favored localities, and will become gen-eral during the present week; some al-falfa was lodged by high winds; range gress is making excellent growth.
