Tropical Fruit Reaches Salt Lake by

Bananas are reported by local deal ers as more plentiful and cheaper this year than last, one reason being that the weather down east has been too cold for the consumption of any large quantliy, which has thrown back into

the west more than usual of this very edible fruit. A car load was received in this city yesterday afternoon, from

New Orleans, and as the shipments received by two prominent local houses aggregate over 100 cars in one season. the total amount shipped into this state in the course of a year is very considerable. It is interseting to know that the

considerable. It is interesting to know that the bananes reaching this market are from Central America, mainly from the state of Nicaragua, and the trees carry four crops a year. The fruit is, of course, shipped green to this country, ripening in transit. Denver is the farthest west general market for the New Orleans shipped fruit and carry are sent west general market for the New Orleans shipped fruit, and cars are sent west from there as special occasion may call for. Bananas are often shipped north in tramp cars; that is consignments leaving New Orleans unsold, and ra-maining in the cars until the cars can be billed to some commission house to be found ready to take them. The wholesale prices are \$1.50 to \$3.00, and retail from 10 cents a dozen to two and three for a nickel. and three for a nickel.
