TALK OF THE TOWN.

When 90° in the shade.
Logan is to have a big celebration on the 4th.
Bishop John Brown, of Pleasant Grove, is in town.
A pretty fair audience at the matinee this afternoon.
Sneak thieves still hover around.

Logan wants a daily mail and a daily paper. By all means get it.
Joseph Meadows and Eli Saxton were admitted to citizenship yesterday.
Rock laying on the McKenzie Opera House is being crowded ahead.
Robt. McWade has been delighting the people of Logan with "Rip Van Winkle."
An assault and battery case from the Nineteenth Ward is occupying Judge Tupper's attention this afternoon.
"Have you seen the comet?" is the prevailing question. The best time to see it is between 3 and 4 o'clock a.m.
An enterprising insurance agent of this city learned a few wrinkles in the Theatre last night, and is doing a rushing business today.
The gathering up of a few carloads of cobble stones on the principal thoroughfares would be appreciated by buggy riders generally.
The members of the 25th quorum of Seventies will meet in the Council House to-morrow (Sunday) at 12.30. A full attendance requested.
Oranges will soon be plentiful. Two car loads arrived from the west yesterday morning, at Ogden, for Ogden and Salt Lake consumption.
A brilliant meteor was seen flying across the heavens about ten minutes past 2 this morning. It was the early bird that caught the meteor in this instance.
The electric light is now being used in several of the business houses of Ogden; but the flickering nuisance, in Ogden, as elsewhere, has yet to be overcome.
At the Police Court this afternoon, a man named Park was fined \$20 and costs for driving a motor car in Main Street, and otherwise creating a disturbance of the peace.
Not only are the grasshoppers playing havoc with the crops—in Beaver, but the pests are reported to be very numerous about Oxford, Idaho.
A grand reception was tendered to General Smith at Fort Douglas last evening. Upwards of two hundred guests were present on the occasion, the whole affair being a brilliant success.

By way of rehearsal of the grand barbecue which is to come off at Mill Farm on the 4th of July, a whole sheep was roasted in the Tithing yard yesterday, and the experiment proved very successful.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Sunday Services.—The Sunday services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will consist of the following: Sunday schools in the various wards at 10 a.m.; general meeting in the Tabernacle at 2 p.m.; ward meetings in the evening. Home missionaries will visit the country wards.
Visitors.—We had a pleasant call this morning from Comte de Eurgot, Paris, Mr. Boggie, Paris, and Mr. Osorio, of Madrid, the latter gentleman being correspondent of the *Vie Parisienne*. They are on a trip around the world and are now on their way to Australia. We wish them a pleasant and prosperous journey.

Running Again.—The Wasatch Flour Mills, which were completely destroyed by fire about the middle of January, this year, are again in operation. The mills, as before, have been fitted up with all the latest improvements in machinery, and hence are capable of turning out a large quantity of flour, etc. The mills are the property of Mr. Husler of the Idaho Bakery, and considering the loss he suffered by the fire in the early part of the year, it is hoped he will now have a turn of luck.

Accident at Ogden Depot.—A man named Matthew Quinn, a wagon maker of Ogden City, got badly hurt yesterday afternoon at the Ogden depot, in trying to jump on the freight train while in motion. He was brought down to the city last evening, arriving about half past six, and was taken to the hospital for treatment. Quinn, who is a man about 50 years of age, is said to have been under the influence of liquor when he made this mad leap, and it is marvelous that he escaped alive. As it is, he is very badly cut on the back of the head.

Dead.—A good man in the person of Brother Andrew Quigley departed this sphere of action on Thursday evening, in St. Mary's Hospital of this City. Brother Quigley, who was well known in this community—but more especially in Cache Valley and in the north—has been a great sufferer from tumors, and in the early part of May, it will be remembered, he underwent an operation in the right groin, from which he recovered for a time. A relapse, however, set in with the result above stated.

The deceased, as far back as 1858, in the Salmon River times, started in company with a Mr. Lake, to carry the express to Lemhi. In that business Mr. Lake was killed by the Indians, and the deceased, riddled with bullets, came very near meeting the same fate.
The body of the deceased was in a very bad condition from other tumors in different parts of the body. It was, however, embalmed and expressed to Swan Lake, Idaho, on the line of the Utah and Northern, his place of residence, yesterday afternoon. Deceased was 49 years of age.

Sad Death of a Young Man.
A most melancholy accident occurred at Brother Edward Smith's brick yard, situated in the Twenty-first Ward, between five and six o'clock this morning, by which a young man named William Hay Knight lost his life. From the particulars we have been able to gather it would appear that Knight went to work this morning as usual, about five o'clock, his employment being to dig out the clay to make brick. At this work he must have been engaged this morning, for between five and six o'clock he was found by a little boy completely covered with clay with the exception of his feet. From this it is evident that the clay at which he had been at work must have fallen upon him, and no one being near at the time, and being unable to extricate himself, he was unfortunately smothered to death. Of course he was extricated as soon as discovered, but life was extinct. An inquest was held this morning, and in accordance with the above facts a verdict of accidental death was rendered.
The deceased was only 27 years of age, and arrived here from New Zealand with his wife and two children about one month ago. He was a man of excellent standing in the Church, and last evening was appointed a Teacher in the Ward in which he resided, the Twenty-first. He was highly respected by all who had made his acquaintance, and his melancholy death is mourned by all his friends. His widow and children have our deepest sympathy in this hour of trial.
We understand he will be buried from the Twenty-first Ward Schoolhouse to-morrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

From Australia.—Last night, several families of Saints, numbering in all some 24, including children, arrived in this city from Australia, in charge of Brother W. W. Day, late President of the Auckland Branch. In conversation this morning with Brother and Sister Lucey, members of the company, we learn that they left Auckland on the steamship *Australia*, on the 24th of May, and arrived in San Francisco, after a splendid passage, in 21 days from the date of sailing, including one day's stoppage at Honolulu. Brother Lucey describes the passage as an exceptionally fine one, smooth water the whole way, and what is very unusual, there was not a rainy day during the three weeks. Arrived in San Francisco, the whole company put up at the International Hotel, and after spending a week sight seeing in the capital of the west, they boarded the cars for Salt Lake City. On arriving here last evening, it was found that Brother Day had a child very sick with pneumonia. Bishop L. W. Hardy kindly took the family home to his own house, where the child, about 15 months old, has since died. We sympathize with Brother and Sister Day in their loss. With the exception of this, the trip from Auckland to Salt Lake has been a pleasant one. Sister Lucey who had nerve enough to undertake the journey with a baby two weeks old, has arrived here and hearty, with the baby in thriving condition.

"Risks."—Last night, a somewhat meagre audience assembled to witness the play of the above name. The reception at Fort Douglas undoubtedly was the cause of so slim an attendance. "Risks" is a very nice little play, in which Mr. Raymond, as usual, was the centre of attraction. All the parts were well sustained.

This afternoon "Fresh" was played at the matinee, and to-night Mr. Raymond makes his last appearance here, for the present, as "Col. Sellers," in the play of "Gilded Age." "There's millions in it." See Raymond personate this celebrated character.

The Fourth of July.—The general committee on the 4th of July celebration met last evening in the City Hall, when further arrangements were made to secure the comfort, convenience and pleasure of the people at the Mill Farm. The matter of dancing floors was left to the committee on park grounds and committee on amusements amalgamated. It was also decided that Mr. Orson F. Whitney be the orator of the day; that Mr. John T. Caine will read the Declaration of Independence; and that there will be five minute speeches from two or three others.
