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THE "LIBERAL" PARTY THROWS OFF THE MASK.

AT THE municipal convention held in September, 1889, the People's Party of this city adopted a Declaration of Principles, which included an arraignment of the so-called "Liberal" party and Its intentions. From this we make the annexed extract:

"Through its persistent misrepresentation the right of trial by jury has been abridged and almost destroyed in this Territory. By procuring unrepublican test oaths and other proscriptive legislation it has disfranchised many citizens, because they would not support its men and measures. For this cause only, it has succeeded in robbing the women of Utah of the elective franchise after they had of the elective franchise after they had exercised it for fifteen years. It has exercised it for fifteen years. It has endeavored to supplant a Legislature elected by the people with a commission appointed by the Federal government. It has sought to erect an insuperable barrier of prejudices gainst the admission of Utah as a State. It seeks to extend to this Territory the infamous enactments by which, in Idaho, thousands of lawabiding citizens are stripped of every political right, solely because of their membership in an unpopular religious organ-It avows, through its organs, ization. its intention to procure such Congressional legislation as will debar all personal legislation as will depart all persons who belong to that religious body from acquiring title to any part of the public domain. It is therefore destructive of popular liberty and unworthy of the support of any just, liberal and patriotic citizen.

"We believe that the supremacy of the 'Liberal' Party means class dis-franchisement, excessive taxation, official extravagance, and laxity in public social regulations."

The stump crators and paid agents of the "Liberal" party endeavor to make it appear that while some individuals connected with the party had favored these extreme and unjust measures, the party itselt and many of its adherents were opposed to them. They tried to dissociate the municipal campaign from any of these issues, stating that they did not enter into it at all. And they avowed that the sole purpose in view was a change in the control of the city, for its material advantage and the benefit of all its citizens.

They cared very little, some of them nothing at all, for polygamy. What they were after was the establishment of minority rule, the overthrow of local government by the will of the majority of the governed, the control of the Territory and its treasury by a faction.

promote and vote for measures and influences to be used for the purpose of disfranchising every honest, lawabiding, trustworthy and progressive American citizen who belongs to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

That is "Liberalism," pure and simple. Its purpose is to steal this Territory. Its methods are those of political piracy. They mean political murder and political robbery. The summary deprivation of all political rights is, to the victim, political death. They who thus strike him down, with such weapons as proposed by the "Liberal" party, become political assassins.
