LOCAL BRIEFS.

Poultry Association to Meet—The Utah State Poultry association will meet tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock at the Commercial club.

Steam Boilers Removed—The steam boiler at the New hotel buildings have been transferred from Exchange place to within the buildings for operation.

Out of Quarantine—J. H. Wilson of the Y. M. C. A. is out today from quarantine due to disphtheria in his family, the legal limit having expired.

Boiler Blew Out—One of the boilers in the public library blew out yesterday, causing a loss of \$150. No one was injured and the building was not damaged.

Foundation Now In—The foundations of the Women's building at Westminster college have been put in and are now ready for the superstructure.

On Financial Business—Cashier George Ford of the First National bank of Provo, was in the city yesterday, en route to Rock Springs on financial business.

Statement Blank—The local U. S. land office has received blanks for declaratory statements and applications for purchase of coal lands. For use by persons desiring to secure such properties.

Detained for Elopement—Advices from Los Angeles are to the effect that Mahel K. Henson, 12 and Harry Henson, aged 16, both of Salt Lake, are detained in the California city for elopement. The couple were even arrested when it was decided to place the boy on probation there, while the girl would be sent to her home.

Shipped to San Francisco—The embalmed remains of Joe. Dowd alias Smith, have been shipped home to San Francisco by Undertaker O'Donnell. In death, the countenance of the desperado indicated that had he been alive, he would have been only a useful citizen, but a man of force of character.

Violent Not Labeled—There is considerable resistance from residents of the Third precinct because the violent over the O. S. L. tracks is not lighted at night, which makes that locality insecure, and it is only a few nights since an attempt was made to hold up a woman there. She managed to escape by hard running and screaming.

To Form Mural Association—The recent graduates of the University of Chicago will meet next Friday evening at the University club to organize a mural association. Some 30 graduates are expected to answer. There are enough graduates of Michigan, Yale, Harvard and Princeton at Salt Lake to organize such association, also.

Eastern Gift Received—Westminster college of this city recently received an eastern gift of \$100, towards the \$10,000 which is to be raised in order to secure a proposed gift of \$15,000 toward the erection of the new building. The \$100 is being expended to raise the \$1,000 which remains yet to be subscribed before the \$15,000 becomes available.

Improvements at Keosauqua—Improvements have been made at the Keosauqua hotel, but they are being carried on so as not to interfere in any way with the hotel administration. One advantage about the hotel is that it is ready as part of the scheme, and there is not the sound of a hammer heard there a day or two in the morning, thus avoiding the disturbance of guests.

Pumping Plant Ready—The pump to be used at the station on Utah lake have arrived and will soon be installed and in running order. Within two weeks City Engineer Kelley, together with the mayor, members of the city council and others, will inspect the plant. The water to be pumped is from the lake to be explained for Big Cottonwood water.

Chauffeurs Annual Ball—The annual ball of the chauffeurs will give their annual ball this evening in the new dancing academy on Market street, with Mayor Hartsfield to lead the grand march. Chauffers will be taken to their homes in autos. The dance will be under the direction of Bert Fuller, Carl Reimann and Jack McRoy. The proceeds of the function will go towards furnishing club rooms for the chauffeurs.

Wake from Love's Dream—The happy love dream of Curtis A. Madson of Provo and Ruby L. Madson of Knightville, Utah county, were interrupted yesterday by Deputy County Clerk Gibbs. Madson had

come all the way from Knightville with his sweetheart in quest of a marriage license. When the girl admitted that she was only 17 years of age, Gibbs flatly refused to issue the license. Unhappily the boy and the girl retraced their steps to the depot and there returned to their high county homes.

More Prisoners Than Cells—There are 241 prisoners at the state prison and 240 cells. As the appropriation for the enlargement of the prison was cut out, the warden is being forced to exercise his ingenuity to distribute the inmates as so not to put too many in one cell. During the first year ending Nov. 30, there were 118 prisoners discharged. What the warden will do when the number of convicts in the course of the next six months, can not be stated, as he does not know himself.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE.

Officers Expected to Arrive in Salt Lake This Afternoon.

Revs. P. A. Baker, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, and Louis Fuller, state organizer, are due to arrive in Salt Lake this afternoon. They will be met by the local officers of the league, who have been carrying on a campaign. The first gun in the Salt Lake campaign will be fired tomorrow evening, in the First Methodist church, the object being to create a sentiment in this city which will be strong enough to reduce the liquor traffic here to its lowest ebb, and eventually wipe it out altogether. The work of the Anti-Saloon league has been carried on effectively in other states, where the sale of intoxicants has been greatly restricted, and in many places destroyed. The visiting league officials will remain through Friday, holding meetings.

NEGRO MINISTER VISITS MURDERER

Day Requests the Rev. John H. Allen to Come to His Lonely Cell.

SHERIFF IS MAKING READY

County Peace Officer Arranging Details of Execution to Take Place Where Executed Faced Death.

Albert T. Day, condemned to death for the murder of Horace H. Voss in Provo, Utah, yesterday, is seeking comfort from a minister of the gospel and within the covers of his Bible, which he has under his pillow during his restless sleep and upon his knees during all of his waking hours. Yesterday he called for the Rev. John H. Allen of the Culinary Baptist church (colored). The Rev. Allen will be with the man waiting his doom day almost constantly from now until the executioner shall summon him from his cell to meet his fate.

Although the choicest viands from Warden Arthur Pratt's kitchen are taken to the condemned man in his cell, he refuses to partake of more food than is absolutely necessary to sustain life.

ARRANGING FOR EXECUTION.

Meanwhile Sheriff C. Frank Emery is arranging the details of the Day execution. He will select five trained marksmen to shoot the negro. The identity of these men will not be known and each will receive \$25 for his work. None of them will ever know whether his rifle ever touched with a bullet or not, one blank being placed in one of the rifles and the other loaded. The man will be placed behind a screen with apparatus only large enough to permit the free use of the rifles. Day will be strapped to a chair placed on an elevated platform near the machine shop in the prison yard. The prison physician will determine the location of the man's heart and will give the target to the spot. Then Day's life will be forfeited to the law.

The execution of Day is the first to occur in the state since Frank Emery was shot for the murder of his wife, three and a half years ago.

PLUM FOR HUNT.

Speaker of Idaho House Named as Receiver at Blackfoot.

Upon recommendation of Senator Heyburn, J. Frank Hunt, speaker of the Idaho house of representatives during the last session, has been appointed by President Roosevelt receiver of the Blackfoot road office. The president has sent in the nomination of Alvin McMahon, the receiver of the land office at Haysley, Thomas W. Smith of Preston, Ida., has secured a position as clerk in the postoffice of the national house of representatives.

COUNTY LICENSE RECORD.

Sheriff C. Frank Emery has completed a table showing the license collections in the county for 1907 and it shows an increase of substantial proportions over the collections for 1906. The recapitulation shows:

Liquor licenses, 1907, \$25,000.38; 1906, \$17,383.38; gain in 1907, \$7,616.99. Merchants and butchers, 1907, \$4,212.58; 1906, \$3,245.38; gain in 1907, \$967.20. Total gain, \$8,584.38.

Of the license collected for 1907, the sum of \$1,500.40 was collected by the sheriff's office in 1907. On Dec. 1, 1907, there were collectible licenses outstanding to the amount of \$54.25.

APPLICATIONS FOR WATER.

Five Filed With State Engineer by Former State Official.

The Salt Lake City corporation filed yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer five applications, by Big Cottonwood water rights, by A. F. Doremus, a former state engineer, who is specially employed by the city in its suit for water. It is stated that the city will proceed to build reservoir in the Big Cottonwood canyon, where there are a number of small lakes. The application reads as follows:

"Salt Lake applies for 150 acres feet of water, the direct source of supply of which is Big Cottonwood fork, Salt Lake county. The diverting works will consist of a diverting dam, system, gateways and covered conduit. The water is to be stored in Lake Phoebe during the period from October 1 of each year to July 1 of each year. It will be used for culinary and other domestic and general municipal purposes."

The corporation filed application to appropriate 425 acres feet of water from Big Cottonwood fork and to be stored in Lake Catherine during the period, and to be used for the same purposes, mentioned in the first application.

The corporation filed application to appropriate 160 acres feet of water from Big Cottonwood fork and to be stored in Lake Marsha during the period, and to be used for the purposes mentioned in the first application.

The corporation filed application to appropriate 600 cubic feet of water from Big Cottonwood fork and to be stored in Lake Twin lake during the period, and to be used for the purposes mentioned in the first application.
