Washington, May 14 .- Again the committee on finance was upheld when the senate today by a vote of 35 to 42 voted down an amendment by Senator Cummins to lower the duty on round iron and upheld the house rate which was recommended by the senate committee.

Almost the entire session was given Almost the entire session was given up to a debate on the profit of the United States Steel corporation, and toward the end of the day personalities were freely indulged in. This occurred after Senator Root had spoken in de-fense of the finance committee and in criticism of senators who had com-plained of the failure of that committee to provide more ample information concerning various schedules. MT Money resented what he characterized as a lecture to the senate and said that if the senator from New York desired less speaking "he should do less of it himself.'

Chicago, May 15.-Favorable weather conditions generally for the fall-sown crop of wheat in this country were not the only bearish factors traders in the wheat pit had to reckon with during early trading today. An unofficial esti-mate on the world's shipments for the week placed the amount at above 10,000,-000 bushels of which amount Russia alone shipped more than 3,500,000 bushels. Notwithstanding these depressing influ-ences, the market rallied materially ear-ly in the day and regarded almost com-pletely an opening decline of 44,60 % to 14,60 %. July, which opened at 1.121% to 1.13. advanced to 1.13%. Corn was weak owing to talk of more liberal re-celpts. July opened 14 to 34 lower at 65% to 34 and sold off to 63%. In the woolen goods division advances continue in many lines, especially in worsteds. The yarn market is irregu-lar; low prices bringing out some busiar: how prices bringing out some outer ness. The shoe buyers are confronted with a rapidly advancing hide and leather market. Most manufacturers are firm in their views. Western coun-try hides are also showing pronounced strength, while foreign dry hides have been mean with the advances secured kept pace with the advances secured on domestic green salted stock.
