TWO HUNDRED GRADUATES

In the Ogden City Schools—Interesting Closing Exercises.

Heard in the Police Court—Death of Samuel Glasgow—Funeral of Samuel Jenkins.

The commencement exercises of the following graded schools of Ogden were held yesterday. Madison, Washington, Pioneer, Mount Fort, Grant and Central. At each of the schools interesting programs were rendered by the students. During the afternoon the upper grades held their exercises, and in the evening the eighth grade. The number of graduates for the past school year is very large, and is an extraordinary showing both for the teachers and students. The exercises rendered do great credit to the public schools of our city, and evidenced the rapid progress they are making. There are about 200 graduates from the eighth grade to the high school. The majority of all of the schools were largely attended by parents and friends. There was hardly a standing room in most of the buildings.

LEHI.

Decoration Day is Fittingly Observed—Sports at Saratoga.

Lehi, Utah Co., May 31.—Yesterday was the most notable Decoration day ever observed in the history of Lehi. About 9 o'clock a. m. the people began to gather at the cemetery, where many were carrying a basket of flowers and are long hundreds of people were decorating the graves of their loved ones while the silver band played a number of selections composed by Prof. Miller specially for the occasion.

The opening of the Saratoga resort yesterday was also characterized by an unusually large attendance.

At 12 noon people began to arrive at the resort and by 3 o'clock nearly 1,000 people were on the grounds. One of the attractions at this place was a match game of ball between Lehi and American Fork. Much interest was manifested in the

game. The game ended with Lehi 11 against American Fork's 8. This was the eighteenth match game Lehi has played this season and have come out victorious every time.

At 2 p. m. the large pavilion at the resort was beautifully lit up with acetylene gas and a large crowd of young people of Lehi and American Fork enjoyed themselves in the merry dances of the dances. It was the first night acetylene gas furnished the light only added to its attractiveness.

VERNAL.

Efforts to Capture Outlaws—Building and Business Boom.

Vernal, May 30.—Upon receipt of the telegram from Sheriff Price, who was then at Thompson's Springs, announcing the killing of Sheriff Tyler of Grand Co., Deputy Sheriff Tolliver with several men, including ex-Sheriff John Pope, went down to Green River to guard the ferries there and on to the "K" ranch to watch the passes. But when they arrived there they learned that the outlaws had already passed about ten hours before. They had ridden rapidly and owing to the delay in getting Sheriff Price's telegram, he having to travel from the scene of the killing to Thompson's Springs before he could telegraph the news, they were not right into the "round up" camp near the "K" ranch, where about twenty-five men were at work branding cattle, but the men were not away of any trouble, made no effort to stop them. It is unfortunate that the telegram was not received earlier, as the desperadoes could easily have been caught by these cow boys and the sheriff's men. As it is they are by this time probably in their old rendezvous, the Powder Springs country. However, Deputy Sheriff Tolliver is working hard to raise a posse to follow them even into their den, but is experiencing considerable difficulty, as a great many are away at the shearing pens in Wyoming, and it is also a very busy time here. It is hoped that a posse of about ten good men will be raised here and that in connection with others from Rawlins and other places the chase will never be abandoned until the outlaws are captured.

It is the belief of persons here who are pretty well posted that the murderers are Cassidy, Lay and McCarly, and if so it will be no easy matter to take them, as they know every pass in the mountains, are bold and fearless and would fight to the death. They have synecyzers, and are very clever. Vernal there are some who are under strong suspicion of giving them aid and comfort.

BUILDING AND BUSINESS BOOM.

Work on the new court house has commenced in real earnest. The foundation work being already in progress. There will be the greatest building boom this summer ever witnessed in the city. In addition to the \$15,000 court house Vernal has voted to build for an \$8,000 central school building; the Ashley Co-op is to erect a large store 40x100 feet. L. Johnson & Sons are going to erect their roller mill here in town, and the Vernal Roller mills, recently burned, are to be rebuilt at a cost of about \$15,000. Besides all this contracts have been let to Vernal parties for about \$5,000 in repairing the officers' quarters and the barracks at Fort Duchesne, besides the large water works contract recently let. At present it looks like mechanics will have to be imported into Vernal to assist in the work.
