BIG CELEBRATION AT MURRAY CITY.

New Municipality Has Double Cause for Rejoicing on Natal Day of the United States.

WHOLE TOWN IN GAY COLOR

Parade of Surpassing Excellence Viewed by Thousands Who Attend from Both County and City.

There will be many more glorious days for Murray but it is doubtful if any of them will duplicate the celebration with which the smelter town declared today and last another village.

MAUSS TRIPLITS A FEATURE.

But perhaps the most interesting display was a tandem pony cart driven by Ylmar Mauss, four years old, in which sat his two sisters Velda and Velma Mauss, also four years old. The cart was labeled "The Parade of Murray—The Mauss Triplets."

FRATERNAL ORDERS OUT.

The fraternal orders were well represented in the parade. The order of Knights of Pythias presented a stirring appearance on horses, in full uniform. The I. O. O. F. rode in a large float, while the Woodmen of the World and the Foresters also occupied floats. About the float of the Foresters rode two men and two women astride on horses, the women representing the very beauties of the Forest, an associate order. The two women were Mrs. John Birch and Mrs. Louis Heller.

THE DAY'S PROGRAM.

The program of the day included every branch of amusement known to American celebrators. There was speech making, catching the greased pig, a big parade, a baseball game, and a games that lasted all afternoon and is scheduled to last all evening. The day started with the parade at 10 o'clock. This function lasted until after 12, and then it headed into Fresno's grove where it disbanded, and a patriotic program was rendered, the features of which were an oration by Frank Holman and an address by Gov. John C. Cutler. The immense crowd found the park far too small to accommodate it, and luncheon parties after filling all the tables in the park collected on the Cottonwood banks and in other shady spots for lunch. At 2 o'clock a program of sports was taken up, and at 4 o'clock a baseball game was scheduled between the Murray team and the Woods Cross aggregation. This is to be followed by an elaborate fireworks display in the evening, with dancing at the Treaders.

CROWD WAS IMMENSE.

The crowd that poured into Murray was no larger an to astonish even the most liberal and elastic minded calculators. People came from the country. At nine o'clock the long line of buggies, farm wagons, and family carriages began to come in from the south and east and west. The city folks came, too, and the cars from the north and south and west. There were no more than a few guards. Extra "trippers" did their best to handle the crowd, but were only partially successful. The Salt Lake land was unable to get about the cars, and finally arrived in the city in several sections. At 11 o'clock, when the parade finally got under way the main street of Murray, State street, was lined with buggies and wagons from Cottonwood bridge to Sixteenth South street, four and five deep on each side of the car track.

HAPPY THRONG.

The mood of the crowd was a joyous and rollicking, yet unobtrusive one. The reason of it was the rejoicing that Murray had come to her own as a city, and was no longer a village. There was no trace of rough handling of the crowd on the part of officials. Hoodlumism was noticeably absent, as were also the small boys with their noise that might have caused serious runs away. As it was no accident of any sort had occurred up to 2 o'clock, and the parade had moved to its conclusion in perfect order and without friction.
