## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRE.**—Last night there was a very good house at the Theatre to welcome the appearance of Mr. Chaplin and Miss Walters, in the new sensation of "Buffalo Bill," leading by the frequent and vociferous applause during the progress of the piece it would have been impossible to please the audience better. "Buffalo Bill" is full of startling scenes and adventures, common to the rough side of frontier and Indian life, and is sure to be a great favorite with a certain class of theater-goers. Its principal characters were well delineated by Messrs. Chaplin, Thompson, Graham, Madden, Thomas, Miss Walters, Clawson, and Jones, Mrs. Downing and others. Miss Walters is a good collector of the Irish character, and her song "Trust to Luck" was well received. The pieces will be played again to-night, and all who desire to see it should not fail to attend, for "Buffalo Bill" will be given place to other novelties, to be presented during Mr. Chaplin's short stay.

**THE CIRCUS.**—The big tent of the San Francisco Circus was jammed last night, the audience numbering probably not fewer than 3,000 people. The various feats of the performers were greeted with frequent and vehement applause. It is not too much to say of this circus that it is the best that has ever visited this Territory. Each part of the performance last night was done in an admirable manner.

The company purpose giving a nightly change of programme during the stay in the city and the circus will, doubtless, be very extensively patronized, judging from the immense audience which attended the inaugural entertainment.

## ELECTION NEWS.

The number of votes for G. Q. Cannon, at the places herein named, is as follows: Logan 300, Richmond 200, Wallsville 275, Payson, Aug. 6th. The election here-to-day passed off quietly, and triumphantly for the regular ticket. The number polled for the People's ticket was 385.

Fillmore, Aug. 6th. The returns of votes cast for the People's ticket in this county, as far as ascertained, are as follows: Fillmore 133, Holden 125, Scipio 113. Three precincts not heard from.

AN ASSAULT.—Last night, just after the close of the performance at the circus, as Messrs. A. M. and D. H. Cannon in company with Mr. Myers of the Mining Journal in this city were conversing on the street, a white man of the name of a person unknown to any of the three, coming from the opposite direction, rushed at Mr. M. and struck him a severe blow on the lower part of the face, and knocked him down, the ruffian then running off in westerly direction. Mr. A. M. Cannon offered twenty-five dollars to any hyphenate who would overtake and capture the "Myers" assailant, but his fleetness of foot and the darkness of the night favored him, and he made good his escape.

THE ELECTION passed off yesterday very quietly, as is customary in this city and in all the cities and settlements of the Territory where respectable bona fide citizens have control. The specious attempt the other night to harangue the people to a pitch of excitement that would impel them to violence was a complete failure, as was also the subsequent bludgeoning for troops to supervise the polls. Some of the men seem to be blessed with an infinitesimal medium of good sense.

ONLY FROSTED.—Yesterday afternoon a woman was sitting under a shade tree on East Temple Street, a short distance south of this Office. One of the mules which daily abound in that vicinity apparently thought the good woman had no business there, for the unmanly brute viciously struck at her with his hind feet, frightening the lady that she rolled over on the side walk, scattering in various directions a number of small parcels she had with her. Fortunately the mule did not reach far enough to strike and the woman was not hurt, but badly scared.

BILIOUSNESS is not the horse that wins, in the opinion of intelligent people. It is a bad horse to stake anything upon. Those who bet upon it are very likely to lose. Abuse is never a safe weapon. He who uses it may expect it to recoil upon himself, which it invariably will for it is the nature of things that it should. Apart from the temporary indignation which all men experience, we always feel well satisfied personally when our opponents resort to abuse, for we are perfectly conscious that they thereby make a fatal mistake, and that they will be the losers in the long run. It is an old rule with professional belligerents—keep your temper if you wish to win, for he who loses his temper loses the fight.

ELECTION—FERRIS ENCOUNTER.—A dispatch from Ophir last night says:

"The polls opened with a terrible encounter between B. Butler, the proprietor of the Grand Hotel, and J. Greenwald, Postmaster. It lasted some time, and the combatants were only separated by the exertions of friends. Pistols were drawn, and the affair is not settled yet."

"About 110 votes were polled. Maxwell's majority is about 100."
