Georgia straw hats and

Columbus Walker, a well-known jewelry dealer of Walla Walla, was thrown from a wagon near Pomeroy, W. T., yesterday, and instantly killed. He was formerly a resident of Lewiston, Idaho, where he was in the Government service twelve years.

At New Almaden, Cal., October 17th, two young men named John Ashworth and Melvin Ketchum, received wounds from the same bullet by the accidental discharge of a pistol in the hands of Ashworth. Ketchum was wounded in the foot and Ashworth in the thigh, neither wound being of a dangerous character.

At Yakima, (W. T.), October 20th, United States Marshal Jesse George seized 15,000 ties and 4,000 cords of wood, cut by Albert Little, from Government lands, to be delivered to the Northern Pacific Railroad.

At Slough station, near Eureka, Nevada, on Sunday, a shooting affray occurred among some Italians, and two of the participants were shot.

Isaac W. Whitney, one of the most respected citizens of Volcano, Cal., was killed on Oct. 16th, by a hunter, who mistook him for a deer. It appears that William Balsley and another went to the Halsey ranch, near Mace's mill, to watch for deer, and during the night Whitney, who was in charge of the ranch, passed close by and was shot by Balsley.

At Columbia, Cal., Oct. 19th, Mrs. Willard Jones was fatally burned. Her clothes caught from her burning house. A coal oil lamp explosion is thought to have been the cause. Mrs. Jones died next morning.

At Glen Ellen, California, Oct. 16th, there was a sharp shock of earthquake. The shock was preceded by a deep rumbling sound, like a passing storm. The vibration, which lasted about fifteen seconds, was from southeast to northwest.

At Portland, Oct. 19, Patrick Healey, a traveling salesman for a San Francisco liquor house and an old-time Pacific coast drummer, committed suicide by taking strychnine. He left a letter to his employers and one to the coroner, asking that an inquest be dispensed with and that his body be buried as quickly as possible.

The authorities at Victoria, B. C., have decided to surrender to the American officers Winslow D. Morgan, who murdered Mr. Haining, in Montana, a couple of months since.

KEYSOR.—In Richfield, Sevier County, October 3d, 1885, Guy M. Keysor; born October 6th, 1816, in the town of Black Rock, Erie County, N. Y.; embraced the Gospel in 1842, and the following summer settled in Nauvoo; in the fall of 1843 he traveled about 2,000 miles to testify of the truth of the Gospel to his relatives. On the 1st of January, 1847, he joined the "Mormon Battalion," and after serving worthily in that connection arrived in Salt Lake City October 1st, 1850, and resided there for twenty-eight years, after which he removed to Richfield. He died firm in the faith.—[Com.]
