MURDER OF A CALIFORNIA CARPENTER.

Want to Fight Against Spain—Nobley's Neck Broken—Death of Anna E. Hagley—Disastrous.

The first California volunteers have organized in San Francisco. The company roster has been sent to the secretary of war, with an application to be enrolled in the event of war with Spain. There are seventy-five names on the roll.

The death of Matt Vampson and Henry Matson is announced. Mr. Vampson, while crossing the Miller creek bridge, happened to come in contact with a horse, which fell over the side, resulting in his death. Matson was injured by falling from the bridge and died Wednesday.

Mrs. Anna E. Hagley, widow of the late H. H. Hagley, ex-governor of California, died at her home in Los Angeles, Tuesday night. She was sixty-five years of age, and was a native of Maine. She was the daughter of Captain Lewis Hagley, a wealthy resident of that city.

Col. W. O. Brodie of Prescott, Arizona, held a conference with Governor McCall in reference to the action that would be required to place a regiment of Arizona cavalry at the disposal of the government immediately after a declaration of war. The regiment, known as the "Arizona Cavalry," has been quickly organized and is now ready for service.

An Indian by the name of Nobley was found dead on the coast of Oregon, two miles above Cannon Beach. Nobley had a contusion on his head, and a bottle of whisky was found near his body. He was wearing a hat and a coat, and was carrying a bundle of goods. It is believed that he was a wanderer, and that he died of starvation.

Tuesday evening Edward B. Haley, a carpenter of South Berkeley, Cal., was shot through the heart and almost instantly killed by Stacy Rogers, a young man painter. The tragedy occurred at the home of Mr. Haley, who was a well-known carpenter in the city. Rogers, who was a young man of about twenty years of age, was a native of California. DIAMONDS IN AMERICA.

More than \$500,000,000 Worth in the United States.

In no country are there more diamonds to be found than in the United States, according to the population. It is estimated by leading diamond dealers in New York, that there are in the United States, diamonds worth \$500,000,000.

Until quite recently diamonds were rarely cut in this country, but American inventors have been successful in developing a method of cutting diamonds which is vastly superior to that abroad.

The new method of cutting diamonds is sometimes called "cutting in the round," but the value is increased probably more than tenfold.

The Dutch city of Amsterdam has been the great diamond cutting center of the world from time immemorial and up to a few years ago over two thousand people in that place were devoted to this trade.

It is not unreasonable to suppose that Amsterdam should continue to hold a monopoly of diamond cutting. As one of the greatest importing cities of the world, New York gradually offered here that is now very flourishing.

In 1868 Henry D. Morse, of Boston, was invented a machine for cutting and polishing diamonds. Since then improvements have been made upon it, and it is now very important.

The advantages continue to make their place by hand. But in this country machinery is largely used.

A German gem expert placed the total value of all the diamonds cut and set in the United States at over \$100,000,000, of which \$50,000,000 worth are in the hands of dealers, carried as stock. All of the other diamonds are in the hands of private owners.

Who owns them? The question naturally arises. It is not very important. The fact is, however, that the diamonds are owned by a few men, and the rest of the world is dependent upon them.
