

PROSECUTION OF DR. E. B. PERRIN

Senate Judiciary Committee
Adopts Resolution Calling on
Attorney-General for Facts.

ARE IN SEALED PACKAGES.

Put There by Bonaparte, Marked
"Confidential," and Left in
Files of Department.

Washington, June 21.—Atty. Gen. Wickersham, by an order adopted by the senate committee on judiciary today, is commanded to send to the senate all the facts in his possession relating to the prosecution of Dr. E. B. Perrin of Williams, Ariz., on the charge of conspiracy to defraud the government in the California land cases.

This data was sealed by Atty. Gen. Bonaparte and the packages, which were left in the files of the department of justice, were marked "confidential." Several days ago members of the sub-committee considering the reappointment of Robert T. Devlin for the United States attorney for the Northern district of California, obtained some information regarding these packages and required Mr. Wickersham to send them to the senate. He declined to do so because of the endorsement on the packages, which, he said, had been placed there by his predecessor, and which he desired to respect. The order to send the data to the senate committee was made so as to relieve the attorney-general of responsibility in the matter.

Confirmation of the reappointment of Mr. Devlin, who was nominated on March 22 last, has been opposed because of criticism of his course in conducting the Perrin case. The sub-committee investigating the Devlin nomination is composed of Senators Elihu Root and Overman. It was brought out during one of their sessions that a report had been made to the department of justice by W. R. Harr, formerly special attorney in land fraud cases, and now an assistant to the attorney-general, bearing directly on the cases in which Perrin was involved. Perrin was convicted, but on an appeal the case was reversed and remanded for retrial. It was said that the conviction had been obtained by reason of perjured testimony given by a witness named C. P. Snell, who had been in Perrin's employ.

The chief criticism of Dist. Atty. Devlin is that he has declined to prosecute the case, although the Harr report declares such action should be taken. Mr. Devlin has been condemned also for his failure to secure the conviction of Snell on a charge of perjury.

PACKAGES OPENED.

Some of the judiciary committee members went to the department of justice, and in their presence Atty. Gen. Wickersham opened the sealed packages and permitted the senators to examine the report made by Mr. Harr. They were not shown any of the correspondence which passed between the department of justice and Mr. Devlin. It was brought out before the sub-committee today that the Harr report declares Perrin's conviction was procured by methods which could not be approved by the department of justice. Mr. Harr gave the details of the indictment of Perrin, which he attributed to

a statement made by W. J. Burns, a United States secret service operative, whose services were loaned to Perrin. Henry in gathering evidence in timber fraud cases.

This statement, which was made to the grand jury, was that he (Burns) had come from Oyster Bay and he knew that President Roosevelt desired to have Perrin indicted. The sub-committee discussed the action and Senator Borah criticized the action and declared to his colleagues that it was decided to proceed on the line recommended by Mr. Harr, which called for the prosecution of Snell on a charge of perjury. Mr. Borah insisted that the reason for Mr. Bonaparte's failure to act should be given.

When a response has been received from Atty. Gen. Wickersham to the order made today, a session of the full committee will be held, and it is possible that the committee may inquire into methods resorted to by the department of justice under the Roosevelt administration in gathering evidence in land fraud cases.

FATHER HAD MORE
SENSE THAN JUVENILE JUDGE

New York, June 22.—Adolph Deutsch, 39, refused to pay a \$2 fine for his 12-year-old son in the child's court yesterday because he believed that the theory of the court was wrong in ordering the punishment of the boy. The judge had ordered a fine of \$2. Mr. Deutsch protested, saying: "There are better ways of bringing up children in the path of righteousness than beating an appreciation of right and wrong into them from the exterior with cruel straps and rawhide. You cannot appeal to my boy by the use of a strap. I will not beat him on your order, nor will I pay the \$2 fine."

Deutsch was later shown that he would have to pay the fine or be locked up, and he paid it under protest, with the promise to carry the matter to a higher court.

On the end of each of the spokes is a sliding weight which is connected with a piston on the spoke behind with these sliding weights. McMahon makes one side of the wheel heavier than the other. The gravity makes the wheel revolve. Fearing that some one might steal his invention, McMahon would not show it until he hears from the patent office.

DIRECTOR LEACH TO RESIGN.

San Francisco, June 22.—Frank A. Leach, director of the mint, will resign from his position to which he was appointed in 1907 by President Roosevelt and will become president of the People's Water company of Oakland, according to an announcement made in that city yesterday. Leach made the formal announcement of his acceptance of the presidency of the water company yesterday and at the same time announced that he would resign his position as director of the mint as soon as he had closed up his several government contracts, which brought him to California a week ago.

Washington, June 23.—Gov. Haskell and 22 other state officials of Oklahoma, including the justices of the supreme court, have joined in a petition to Congress, through Representative Creager, asking that all coastwise traffic be placed under the jurisdiction of the interstate commerce commission.

Petition in Bankruptcy Filed Against

New York, June 22.—Alleging liabilities of \$1,000,000, a petition in bankruptcy was filed yesterday afternoon against the Leeds & Catlin company, manufacturers and wholesale dealers in disc and cylinder records for talking machines, by Leonard Groner, attorney for several creditors. The judge in the United States district court said he would consider the appointment of a receiver today. The petition alleges that the company is insolvent and asks for preferential payment of \$10,000 and transferred assets of \$5,000.

business in the country. It has a large factory at Middletown, Conn., with offices in New York, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Denver and San Francisco. The company was started in 1882 on a small capital and worked up to an enormous business. The company's statement of Aug. 31, 1908, showed liabilities of \$281,122 and assets of \$2,003,000. A recent decision of the United States supreme court holding that this company had been infringing on the basic patent of another large concern at Camden, N. J., is believed to have been responsible for the action yesterday. Following this decision thousands of retailers throughout the country notified the Leeds & Catlin company, it is said, that they would not pay for the stock they had on hand for fear of claims from the company held to be the rightful owner of the patent.

AUTO LEAPS THE
GAP OF NECESSITY

Milwaukee, Wis., June 22.—Leaping the gap as performed in a circus, was a simple feat compared with the experience of Dr. William E. Durr of this city yesterday when his automobile made a spectacular jump across the 10-foot space between the rapidly-rising wings of the Bascule bridge at First avenue viaduct.

Dr. Durr was hurrying on an emergency call when he approached the bridge. The viaduct at this point is nearly 50 feet above the river. When he approached he did not hear the warning cries of the bridge tenders until his machine was on a rapid slide, was upon the north lift. Then he found the bridge was ascending with the south arm of the bridge slightly below that on which he was ascending. Putting a full power his machine leaped the crossing to the south arm, a space of 10 feet.

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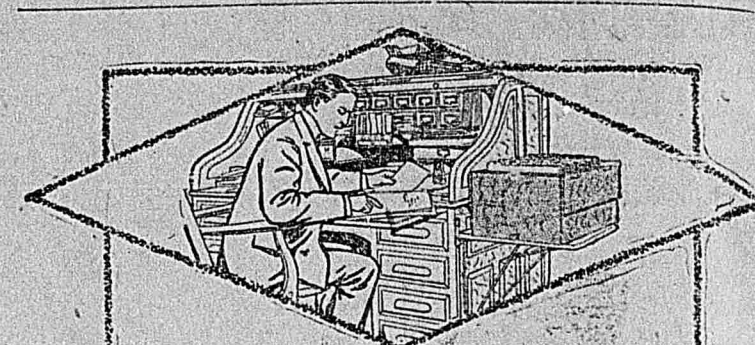
