Dear Brethren-We invite your care-ful perusal of the following communication from Prof. Evan Stephens and ask for your hearty co-operation in giving effect to his suggestions so that the musical interest of our Sunday schools may be still farther advanced. Please give publicity in your schools and ward meetings, by the permission of your Bishops, of the proposed establishment of these music classes, embracing the members of your schools of the ages of

The books will be furnished as cheaply as nosable, about

Now let the matter be done heartily, and at once, and it will prove a bless-ing and a musical salvation in the fuing and a musical salvation in the fu-ture for our whole community, as its success will cause all other Stakes to emulate your example. If no move is made in other Stakes, and any near enough to attend the city classes wish to take the course, I would urge that they be given the privilege. I have found many of my past brightest pu-pils to comp from Farmers, Sugar House and Forest Dale wards now in the Granite Stake, and I should not like to see them shut out if they have no similar privilege in their own
