SPECIAL AUDITORS ARE DISCREDITED.

Council Committee Says Their Work Was Carelessly Performed.

AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY.

Ogden City Voting Districts Reduced One-Half—Boundaries of New Voting Precincts.

Ogden, May 28.—At last night's session of the city council the report of the special committee to whom was referred the report of the special auditing committee was presented and adopted. The report was signed only by William Craig and Edwin Williams. Chris Fly, the third member of the committee, refused to attach his name to the report, giving as his reason that he had not time to consider it. Embodied in the minutes of the meeting at which the full report was originally presented was the comment passed by Craig, Glasman and Critchlow. The finance committee's report occupied several large typeset sheets. The first paragraph contained the following dash of whitewash: "After carefully examining the report of the special auditors and comparing same with the records of the recorder, we find it to be in accordance with the facts that we are at a loss to know from what source they arrived at their conclusion. It is evident from the marked discrepancies in the report and the record that the work of the special auditors must have been done in a very careless manner."

Then followed the citation of a number of warrants which the auditors' report claimed were not properly indorsed and signed. In each instance they stated that the papers bearing these qualifications were filed in the recorder's office, and this fact alone bears out the contention of Messrs. Harris and Hollingsworth, who insisted that the warrant proper on file in the auditor's office was the one that should be indorsed and signed instead of the committee's report filed with the recorder. In their own defense the committee laid great stress upon the work done at the present time, being merely a continuation of a custom which had covered many years. They admitted that a number of regular payrolls had not been presented before the council on account of being regular salary payable at the end of each month under resolution by the council. In closing the committee had this to say of the men who did the auditing: "One of the incompetent manner in which the special auditors have done their work, we attach but little importance to their recommendation, and for legal advice we would prefer to consult the city attorney. Since that part of the report which deals with the financial condition of the city is not affected by the discrepancies appearing in other parts, we would recommend that, with the exception of said discrepancies, it be accepted and filed."

There was no discussion of the question in open council. A motion to allow the \$500 due them for their services was passed immediately afterward, with Councilman R. B. Palmer voting in the negative.

Fire Chief Palmer submitted a number of recommendations to the council, which were promptly by the recent fire in the business district. He asked for four additional firemen, and also for a station, that a station be established on the bench; that more hydrants be established throughout the city; that more alleyways be opened, with fire escapes in them; that the water main be extended as far as Five Points, and that the Five Points fire department be brought up to the standard. The recommendations were referred to the fire and law committees.

The Trades and Labor assembly asked that when contracts are let for city work, the eight-hour-day clause be included therein. They claimed that there was a gross violation of this law by the contractors handling the city work.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Reduce Voting Districts of Ogden City From 25 to 13.

Ogden, May 28.—The board of county commissioners at a meeting held at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon took up the matter of reducing the number of voting districts from 25 to 13. This action is to be taken so that the 13 voting machines purchased recently by the city and county jointly can be used to cover the entire city at the election to be held the coming November. After discussing the proposition thoroughly the commissioners decided on redistricting the city as follows, if County Atty. Hulaniski, to whom the matter was referred, approves of the same.

District No. 1.—The present first and second districts, having a total vote of 424.

District No. 2.—Part of the third and all of the fourth, with a total of 465 votes.

District No. 3.—All of the fifth and part of the third, having a total vote of 523.

District No. 4.—All of districts seven and nine, with a total of 519 votes.

District No. 5.—All of the sixth and eighth, with a total of 486 votes.

District No. 6.—All of the tenth and thirteenth, with a total of 436 votes.

District No. 7.—All of the eleventh and twelfth, with a total of 593 votes.

District No. 8.—All of the fourteenth and fifteenth, with a total of 593 votes.

District No. 9.—All of the sixteenth and seventeenth, with a total of 578 votes.

District No. 10.—All of the eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth, with a total of 584 votes.

District No. 11.—All of the twenty-first and twenty-second, with a total of 584 votes.

District No. 12.—All of the twenty-third and part of the twenty-fourth, with a total of 468 votes.

District No. 13.—Part of the twenty-fourth and all of the twenty-fifth, with a total of 523 votes.

A communication was received from Sheriff Sebring stating that the duties of his office have increased so rapidly that he needed another deputy, and asked the board to confirm the appointment of George Ritchie, which was done. Mr. Ritchie will look after the office work of the office; he is a very competent young man, and was employed until last week as day county clerk, resigning to accept the new duties.

Miss Florence Bohn was appointed deputy assessor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of S. E. Thomas.

Commissioner Madison reported having sold last week, property owned by the county bought in by tax deeds, to the amount of \$101.00.

The commissioners granted permission to the Oregon Short Line to run a small pipe line from the country reserve at the Ogden Short Line station, to provide water for a lawn, flower bed and other improvements it expects to make at the station.

Next Monday the board will take up the appointment of registration agents for Ogden City. The application received up to the present time have been ordered filed.
