Died at Bountiful, Davis County, Utah, June 11th, 1881, after a lingering illhess of paralysis, Patriarch JOHN STOKER, aged

64 years, 3 months and 3 days.
Deceased was born in Jackson County, Ohio, where he resided till 1836, being a farmer by occupation. In the month of November, 1833, he became a member of the Church, being baptized by Elder Seymour Brunson, then on a mission to his native place. With his family, in the spring of 1836, he moved to Far West, Missouri, where he shared the trials and persecutions of the Saints in that State. In the spring of 1839 he moved to Adams County, Illinois, where he remained with the Church till 1842, thence he moved to Hancock County, Illinois, where he remained the four following years, moving with the Church in 1846 to the western part of the State of Iowa. In April, 1848, he left Iowa for the mountains, being appointed by Elder Lorenzo Snow captain of 50 wagons, reaching Salt Lake City September 27th, same year; there he remained a few days, when he started north for what is now known as Bountiful, where he settled with the four families then encamped there. Two years and three months later North Canon Ward of the Church was organized, of which he was ordained the bishop under the hands of Presidents Young, Kimball and Elder J. M. Grant.

The following 23 years he acted as the Bishop of said Ward, remaining at home more or less all the time save the fall and fwinter of 1809, when with Elder J. M.
