FRAGMENTS.

Justices ANTHONY held no court this morning.

The wounded man from the penitentiary was still breathing the air of liberty.

HARVEY WALLACE, of the Wallace, who has been confined to his room with sickness for the last week, was released this morning.

Suey has been brought by Sheriff H. C. Williams, of the Third District Court, for alleged wanton assault of a son similar to an attachment against the property of O. E. Murphy.

THE ANSWER TO THE DEFENDANT IN THE CASE OF WILLIAMSON V. COLEMAN vs. WILLIAM L. SIMPSON and Martin Gammie has been filed with the Third District Court.

JOSIAH THOMAS and William Palmer were in custody awaiting sentence, sentenced by Justice Goss to five-day imprisonment in the city jail for shooting.

HUNTER, the entrepreneur, demanded \$1,000 in damages, and on Saturday, he, as plaintiff, appeared before Justice Goss in the Salt Lake City Court, and was given temporary judgment in his favor, and the defendant named, to the county attorney.

THE SALT LAKE ARMY was arrested and taken to police headquarters, and eight hours of questioning the strength of the party was the result. The trial was suspended, and the case was referred to the county attorney, who has been retained to prosecute the trial.

TUESDAY was a shooting scene in a building containing drug stores and night clubs. The discharge of firearms arrested the inmates, but when they were discovered to be unarmed, the two parties fled. The shooting was so severe that both individuals had been severely beaten.

The old arguments in the Salt Lake Company were continuing before Judge Anderson on Saturday afternoon, and the court adjourned at noon. The trial will be suspended, and the case will be referred to the county attorney.

A TUESDAY's impact was in progress this morning when the remains of James Kirkpatrick, a citizen in the employ of T. H. Jones, the well known architect, were found buried during the absence of the family between the hours of 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. in the rear of the meeting room of the church, where the members of the choir had been gathered.

The deceased goods were also contained in the flames. The insurance is reported at about \$2000. —From Deseret News, March 20.

Driggs, establishing for assistance to make approaches to Ward House more convenient, Daniel McMurtry, attorney for the estate of James McMurtry, his brother, James McMurtry is liable for his support. Ordered that James McMurtry pay James Kirkpatrick his funeral expenses, and that he be allowed to build a street east on State street, east of Ward House, way company line. Ordered that payment be granted him, and that he be granted a license to run a small grocery store.
