TAFT SPEAKS ON

Manila, Nov. 6 .- Seey, Tuft in an address at a banquet given by the Pregregiet: party just night, spoke of he history of party divisions and declared that their existence was a neclared that their existence was a ne-cessary part of the changes in the Philippings. "The only method of conducting popular government," he said, "is by political parties. The Fed-eral party at the time of its organiza-tion was in no sense political. When it existed it was the only party organ-ized to convince the people to accept the promises of the Americans. It worked bravely and faithfully to this end, and to such an extent that much of the success of the early govern-ment of the islands was in no small measure due to the Federalists. sought peace and taught the people to each peace. "After the irm establishment of the government had been established, a change was natural. In elections for members of the assembly it was nat-ural for the people to divide. Knowing and talleving that both the National-ist and Progressitas have the interest of the government at heart, the ques-tion of which shall control is settled only by an election, sometimes casting party information one way and some-times another.

only by an election, sometimes casting party information one way and some-times another. "The itest principle of party politics neucessary to learn is that defent must not cause disconsagement. The first lesson in self-government that voters have to learn is to be good losers, and when that is learned, to be good win-hers, because self-government lim-poses restraint on both sides. Tho minority must not strike to strike down the work of their opponents be-ounse they are not in control, and the musjority must so conduct affairs as to show that the people have a certain, definite part in the government. Noth-its has given greater pleasure of more confidence in the success of what we are doing than the action of the as-sembly.
