INSURANCE **ELECTION FRAUDS**

G. R. Scrugham. Who Inspired the Present Investigation, is Himself Arrested.

CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY

Two Other Men Identified With International Policyholders' Committee Taken Into Custody.

New York, April 25.-Sesational resuits have quickly followed the inquiry of the district attorney's office Into the recent election of directors of theNew York Life Insurance company

George R. Scrugham, manager of the International policyholders' committee which inspired the present investigation, making grave charges against those who conducted the election, was himself arrested at Albany tonight and put aboard a train for New York.

Scrugham is charged with conspirt cy, and he was the third man identi fied with the international policyholders' committee to be taken into custody since noon today. The others are Charles Stirrup and Charles F. Carring These two were not members the committee, but were employed a vatchers for the committee at the ele-

election of the Mutual Life Insurance company, while Carrington acted in a similar capacity at the New York Life

They are specifically charged with having "unlawfully conspired together for the perversion and obstruction of the due administration of the laws of the state of New York with relation to the election of the directors of the New York Life Insurance accession."

Stirrup, it is alleged, was employed in the office of the policybolders' committee previous to Dec. 18, and the officuse with which he is charged was committed prior to that date.
Earlier today Jacob Frank, a New York Life company agent, was arrested, charged with forgery in the third degree. Frank had been summoned to explain the signatures of several policyholders to alleged forged ballots cast in the recent election of directors of the

the recent election of directors of the New York Life.

The policyholders' committee headed by Scrugham as manager and Samuel Untermyer as counsel, and with a mem-

Untermyer as counsel, and with a membership of many distanguished persons in this country and Europe, fought the "administration" tickets in the recent election of directors of the New York and Mutual Life Insurance companies.

Scrugham was arrested while in Albany in connection with insurance legislation looking to the reform of insurance company elections. He was expected here tonight, and was awaited by representatives of the district attorney's office, who met the train when it reached the Grand Central station at 10:10 o'clock. When he did not arrive, it is stated, his arrest was ordered in Albany.

Samuel Untermyer, counsel for the policyholders' committee, gave out the following statement tonight:

"My attention was only cailed to this complaint late tonight. During a considerable part of the campaign I was in Europe. I know nothing about the subject of the complaint except what I have just heard, but it looks on its face very much like a cry of 'stop thlef' on the part of the companies. They know that the forgeries on the part of the companies ran into the thousands and they would like to obscure the issue.

"I have no doubt Mr. Scrugham will be able fully to meet this latest move on the part of the companies to cover

Since the elections in both the New York and Mutual companies on Dec. 18 the district attorney's office has been looking into the counter charges of crooked work by the administration crooked work by the administration party and the policyholders' committee. Representatives of both sides have been heard and many ballots have been examined. Nothing definite was done, however, until after the official count was announced, showing the administration tickets to be the victors ministration tickets to be the victors by large majorities in both companies. Carrington, Sthrup and Scrugham were in the district attorney's office yesterday and were examined sep-

arately.

Today four women clerks employed by the policyholders' committee in preparing ballots were examined in the district attorney's office. Soon after that the complaint against three polleyholders' committee employes was drawn up. Stirrup and Carrington could not secure ball and were locked
