1887, and now in force: SEC 10.—Wherever from any distillery, brewery, tannery, hide house, pork house, laundry, fish house, soap factory, or any yard, dwelling, store or factory, or any yard or enclosure of any kind weatsoever within the limits of this city, there is placed, conducted or discharged into or on any street, alley, sidewalk, gutter, water ditch or canal, or any vacant let, any filthy or of-fensive water, liquid, waste, refuse or discharge of any kind which is offensive or liable to become so, the same shall be deemed a nutsance. Sec. 13.—Any putrid or unsound meat, fish, hides or skins of any kind, or filth, offal, dead animals, vegetables, or any un-sound or offensive matter whatsoever, thrown, placed or conducted into or upon any street, alley or lot, or into any sque-duct, ditch.gutter or canal, shall be deemed a missance.

DIFETHERIA exists at a residence on Third South Street, between Second to kept, collected or used in any manner

the kept, collected or used in any manner detrimental to the public health, any Wrap-ping paper, waste paper, hand bills, old clothes, boots, shoes, hats, tin cans, broken dishes, or any combustible material, or any rubbish whatsoever thrown into or upon any street, alley, sidewalk, gutter, ditch, aqueduct or caual, or vaçant lot, shall be deemed a nuisance. SEC 18.—Any person or persons who shall be convicted of being the author or keeper of a nuisance, or otherwise guilty of a vio-lation of any provision of this ordinance, shall be fined for the first offense not less than ten dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, and for the second offense not less than twenty five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, and for the third and all subsequent offenses not less than fifty dol-lars nor more than one hundred dollars.
