

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Hail.—The first hail of the season fell this morning, following close upon the first genuine fall of flakes which came Monday.

Bishops' Meeting.—The bishops and lesser priesthood will hold their regular semi-monthly meeting tomorrow evening at half past six o'clock in the Council House.

Received.—Harper's Weekly and other leading periodicals have been received at James Dwyer's, also Fick with its colored cartoons, which far excel the once inimitable productions of Nast.

Select Party.—A select party, complimentary to Elder James W. Hardy, prior to his departure on a mission to the Southern States, will be given on Thursday evening, the 11th inst., in the Seventh Ward Hall. Clive's band will furnish the music.

A New Estray Pound.—The City Council have been engaged for several weeks in preparing an ordinance establishing a City Estray Pound on Washington Square. The bill passed its second reading last night, and at the next session will very likely pass by its title.

Matinee Concert.—On Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, the grand concert which was given in the Assembly Hall last Monday night, will be repeated at the same place for the benefit of such as could not attend the other. Those who go will be delighted. The concert is really worth hearing.

Millard County Returns.—From C. Anderson, County Clerk of Millard County, we learn that the elections in that county on the 2nd inst. passed off peaceably; 544 votes were polled, of which Hon. George Q. Cannon received 510, and A. G. Campbell 34.

Fillmore gave Campbell 25 votes, Scipio gave him 5, Kanosh 4.

Stray Animals.—Citizens in various parts of town are complaining of the large number of stray cows and other animals running about the streets, knocking down or opening the gates of private residences and making themselves at home generally on the premises. We hope this nuisance will be checked by the ordinance now under preparation by the City Fathers instituting a stray pound and giving any person the right to take up and impound all animals running at large within the limits of the city. People who turn their cattle and horses out to prey upon their neighbors will hereafter be made to go down into their pockets after damages.

Missionary Letter.—Elder S. C. Stephens writes, under date of the 30th ult., from Felton, Harlan County, Ga., where he is at present laboring in company with Elder W. Scott, of Provo, that matters are progressing favorably in that region with respect to the spread of the Gospel. The elders are meeting with just enough opposition to cause them to realize their true position, and appreciate the truth of the religion they promulgate, and are gradually making friends among the people, some of them leading men in society. The Saints are doing their best to live their religion, and the field of labor is steadily widening. Some of the Saints will probably emigrate this fall. The elders are in good health.

Returned.—We had a call this morning from Brother M. B. Ship, who returned about a week ago from Philadelphia whither he went about three months ago for the purpose of studying medicine and also to preach the gospel. His health becoming poor, he was compelled to return to Utah, since which he is feeling much improved. His sickness was caused by overwork. He studied ardently and confined himself too closely to the dissecting room of the college where he was pursuing his investigations. He had, during his absence, opportunities of preaching "Mormonism" to many who had never heard it before, and feels satisfied of having accomplished good in this direction. As soon as his health permits, he intends travelling through the Territory to give short practical lectures on the important science of physiology, the laws of health and life.

The Canal Route.—The City Council heard, last night, a petition from a number of the residents of Mill Creek requesting the reconsideration of the Council's resolution to adopt the upper route from that point to this city, for the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal, and praying them to adopt the lower canal route instead. A remonstrance to this petition was also presented, signed by other Mill Creek residents, representing that they were interested in the old canal route passing through Mill Creek, which was at present used by them as an irrigating ditch, and also stating that the signers of the petition was in no wise interested in the ditch. The remonstrance was presented in person by a number of gentlemen from Mill Creek, constituting a committee from that settlement, chosen at a mass meeting held the other evening, at which the remonstrance was framed. Both petition and remonstrance are now in the hands of the committee on improvements. It is very unlikely that the resolution of the Council choosing the upper route, will be reconsidered. It has been decided for good and sufficient reasons, to run the canal along the upper survey, and that is the way it will undoubtedly come. By so doing, not only will more of the city be watered than could be done by using the lower route, but much litigation will be obviated, which would inevitably take place between the city and those interested in the irrigating ditch referred to, if the Council should make the change asked in the petition.

CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, November 9, 1880, Alderman Sheets presiding:

A petition was read signed by Adam Speirs and eight others, constituting a committee appointed by the residents and land owners of the First, Second and Tenth Wards of the city, which represented that the people of said wards held exclusive control of the waters of Emigration Creek for culinary purposes, and in the spring of 1849. That in the year 1868, one H. H. Harris and other parties settled and took up farms on the bench south of the Inman Agency, outside of the corporation limits, and used the surplus or waste waters upon said farms. That said parties upon said petitioned the City Council for a portion of the creek, which was denied them as there was barely enough water, when in a low stage, for the city wards, and that although they petitioned twice more they were each time refused by the Council. That the said H. H. Harris and others during the past summer petitioned the water commissioners of Salt Lake County for one-half of Emigration Creek, and that although the original owners of the waters proved their right to the water rights and the inhabitants of the wards petitioned for vested water rights which they had enjoyed undisturbed for 18 years. As Salt Lake City corporation was directly interested, by owning one block of the Tenth Ward Square which draws its supply of water from said stream, and indirectly interested in protecting their citizens in their water rights and in keeping water owned by the citizens from being diverted out of the corporate limits on to farming lands, the petitioners respectfully asked the co-operation of the Council in any further proceedings that might be necessary to protect them in their rights to the use of said water.

T. B. Jones, of the Fifteenth Ward, petitioned that the fence crossing the sidewalk which adjoins his property at the end of First South street, which fence was ordered by the Council to be removed on or before November 1st, be allowed to remain until the removal of such removal be extended, unforeseen circumstances having rendered it impossible for him to comply with the requirements of the Council within the time allotted. Laid on the table.

A. B. Taylor presented a communication in regard to the purchase of land described in the Ordinance of October 28th. The land desired was now and ever had been vacant and unproductive, and Mr. Taylor proposed to purchase the same for \$10,000, upon the land, so that it would become a source of revenue to the city as well as a benefit otherwise, and if taken of good faith were required, he would be willing to take an agreement from the city specifying that the improvements should be made prior to the deed for the land being given, and that a right of way over the land to Emigration Creek be retained by the city. Referred to committee on public grounds.

The committee thereupon asked an expression from the Council of its views as to whether the corporation should dispose of its lands held for the public benefit to private individuals. After discussion it was decided to refer the matter to a committee that no lands in that vicinity be sold to any person, but that they be reserved for the benefit of the public.

A petition was submitted from John Herbst and 37 others, residents of Big Cottonwood and Mill Creek Wards, and interested in the route of the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal, asking the Council to reconsider the resolution adopting the upper line as the route for said canal. The petitioners endorsed instead thereof the lower line, or the old Church Canal, which was already excavated to a considerable extent and endangered no houses, while on the upper route, south of Mill Creek, the line, for a long distance, runs along a loose sand and springy side hill, endangering the safety of the houses immediately below.

A remonstrance to the petition, signed by E. H. Williams and 38 others, citizens of Mill Creek and Cottonwood Wards, and owners of a water ditch known as the Lower Canal, was also read, protesting against any change or reconsideration of the route now adopted by the Council for the canal referred to. The signers of the remonstrance set forth that they were the owners of the lower canal and had used it as a water ditch to convey the waters of the Big Cottonwood Creek to their farms for the past eight years, and that they did not wish nor did they intend to be molested in their rights. They called attention also to many of the names attached to the petition for reconsideration, and stated that they were non-owners and had no claim or rights whatever in the lower canal.

After remarks by gentlemen composing a committee appointed by the citizens of the wards aforementioned, who were in favor of the remonstrance, both petition and remonstrance were referred to the committee on improvements, and Aldermen Pyper and Raleigh were added thereto, for the consideration of this matter.

The committee on improvements, to whom was referred the petition of Wm. Varley, in reference to Wm. Jennings & Sons, agents for the Dupont Powder Co., storing powder in a house belonging to Joseph Burns, etc., reported that they had visited the place and found that the powder is not at present in a very safe place, but that it was the understanding that it should only remain there a few days while they are rebuilding their magazines. The committee recommended, however, that the city Marshal require the agents of the powder company aforesaid to place a guard over the house until the powder is returned to the magazine. Adopted.

Bill of Estimates. Taylor & Co., for lumber for city estray pound and watering trough on Washington Square \$54.67 was allowed.

An ordinance in relation to the city estray pound was taken up, and the various provisions thereof discussed until a late hour.

Pending final action, however, the Council adjourned for one week.

Y. M. M. I. A.—The Sixth Ward Y. M. M. I. A. met last evening, the Bishop and Counselors of the ward being present. The following officers were elected to serve during the current season: President, Jas. H. Anderson; First Counselor, Arnold G. Glaugue; Second Counselor, Jas. H. Poulton; Secretary, Wm. N. Anderson; Assistant Secretary, Robt. C. McEwan; Treasurer, Edward J. Eardley; Librarian, Peter Condie; Programme Committee, Thos. Green, Jas. Poulton, David E. Fullmer. The meetings will be held on Tuesday evenings, at 7 o'clock.
